COOS EXHIBIT AT BIG FAIRS

CLAIM THAT BUILDING AT LEWIS & CLARK FAIR BROUGHT MANY HERE—DIFFERS FROM R. A. COPPLE.

Editor Coos Bay Times:
In your issue of the 23rd instant, in your report of the proceedings of the Business Men's Association at the banquet given at the hotel Chandler, you quote Mr. Copple as having stated that a Coos County building at the Panama Pacific Exposition, would hinder the very thing aimed at. That he was very much disappointed at not finding a Coos County exhibit in the Oregon building and that he did not know that Coos County had a separate building for its exhibit until after he returned home, that he declared that hundreds of people left with the impression that Coos county did not have an exhibit at the fair. The facts are the following: no county in the state had their exhibits in the Oregon building. That Coos county had the best and most conspicuous exhibit of any county in the state, and received one third of the capital prize of \$1000.00 for her exhibit, and that a gold medal was awarded for the Coos county building which was the principal exhibit. That Chairman Fairbanks of the awarding committee, stated at the banquet held at the Inside Inn, where the awards were announced that Coos County was clearly entitled to the whole of the capital prize, but that the committee finally decided to divide this among three counties as the other two counties had very fine exhibits and were entitled to some consideration. At the Lewis and Clark fair Coos county was universally recognized as the only real live county in the state, and this was solely on account of the Coos county building, and it did its work.

Numerous people who are now residents of Coos county came here and located on account of what they saw of the Coos county exhibit. No better scheme could be devised than for Coos county to have its own building at the Panama Pacific Exposition, as in this case the building itself would be the principal exhibit. Aside from its great value as an advertising medium the building would be the home for the thousands of Coos county people who will be at the fair during its continuance. This is no small consideration. No effort should be spared to secure concessions from the fair officials at San Francisco for a Coos county building; it is absolutely the only way that Coos county can get proper recognition and would worth thousands of dollars to the county.

APPLE CROP IS HARD

C. H. Dungan Says Late Frost Practically Ruined It—Other Fruit Crops Fine.

The apple crop of this district is only a fraction of what it should be this year owing to damage done by the late frost, according to C. H. Dungan, a leading Coos River grower who was in Marshfield today. He said that the Gravenstein and Golden apples were the worst hit, and that the late apples had also been severely damaged. He has about 300 venstein trees and off the orchard does not expect to secure a crop. Whether the damage done to the Coquille valley orchards is not known.

Mr. Dungan says that the cherry crop suffered a temporary setback last week, the extreme heat scalding the berries on the trees. Many thought it would be the saving of the crop but development have proven otherwise.

Other Crops Good.
Mr. Dungan says that the potato will be fair and the other fruit crops will be good.

The prospects are for the best and best crop of plums that has been raised here. Cherries are fine and the small berries are usually profitable.

Mr. Dungan says that the season about three weeks ahead of the average, lots of wild blackberries being found in the hills.
