

SPROULE LIKES COOS BAY LINE

EUGENE, Ore., May 28.—William Sproule, president of the Southern Pacific, made his first trip of inspection over the new Willamette Pacific railroad into the Siuslaw valley, and he was delighted with what he saw. He inquired about the country through which he passed, asked many questions and said but little. He asked particularly how soon the line would bear traffic to tide water, and he was pleased when he was told that it would be by September at least.

"I am much impressed with the possibilities of traffic over this line," he said before leaving. "I am told that it is helping Eugene already. The service already established is well patronized, and I believe that people from Coos Bay are already going out by way of Eugene over the new line."

It was suggested that announcement might be made soon about building shops for the new Coos Bay line.

Mr. Sproule, however, would make no statements regarding these, or railroad development, other than state that finances are such that no railroad work, except the Coos Bay line, can be done this year. He stated definitely that the electrification of the P. E. & E. will not reach Eugene this year.

Many Motor Cars.

We've been bringing for four months to get a motor car for the Eugene-Corvallis run over the Portland, Eugene and Eastern," said John M. Scott, general passenger agent, speaking of the P. E. & E. service until electrification is established. "We can get plenty of gasoline motor cars, but none of them have a baggage compartment and for this line we must have a car with a baggage compartment."

TELLS OF DEATH.

Inquest to Determine Cause of J. C. Walling's Son-in-Law's Death.

A Portland paper has the following concerning the son-in-law of J. C. Walling of Marshfield, Mr. and Mrs. Walling having left for there Monday:

"While the police maintain that R. Lynn Townsend, aged 28, met his death by accidental drowning, the relatives and friends of the dead man, whose body was found under the dock of the North Pacific Lumber company Saturday night, think the Hillsboro chemist died of foul play. Townsend disappeared a week ago Friday night, after spending the evening with Mr. C. Hammond, his partner, and when Townsend failed to keep an appointment the following day, Hammond notified the police. According to Hammond, Townsend left him in the best of spirits. Mrs. Townsend, who arrived here yesterday, said the same thing concerning Townsend's mental attitude when he left his home at Hillsboro the day before he disappeared. An inquest will be held today.
