## Industrial Review of the State

NEW FACTORIES, IMPROVEMENTS AND ENTERPRISES THAT INCREASE THE PAYROLLS AND PROMOTE THE DEVELOPMENT OF OREGON

A cannery and evaporator are to be erected at Alvadore. In the primary election just held every candidate for Governor who advocated laws interfering with industries and imposing new burdens on manufacturing was defeated. The first of the Astoria-San Francisco line of Hill steamers will be launched July 1st at the Cramp yards in Philadelphia. The Willamette Pacific grade between Lakeside and Winchester is being thrown up by a sixty ton level. The Washington minimum wage and eight hour law for women does

not apply to the fruit industry as it does in Oregon. The H. M. Bylesby company took up community advertising of the Pacific coast in connection with each of their thirty-four plants. Salem has raised funds for the annual Cherry Fair to be held about the end of June. Reports made at the meeting of the state grange showed that in many parts of the state young women were thrown out of employment by the operation of the minimum wage and eight hour law. Nineteen counties in Oregon will lose \$460,398 taxes this year by suits attacking the O. & C. land

grant. Litigation has already cost the state nearly as much and the lands are withdrawn from settlement.

The Pacific Northwest sent out \$3,069,635 fruit shipments in 1913. The Catholic cathedral will be erected in East Portland will cost for building and grounds, \$1,000,000. The Knights of Columbus will erect a club building to cost \$100,000. M. D. Hammill of Albany is planning a 100-room hotel at Bandon. A \$52,000 armory is being planned for Eugene. Springfield is to have fountains on the principal streets.

## SURVEY HARBORS ON COAST.

**Government to Ascertain Depths at Tillamook, Siuslaw and Coos.**  
A Portland paper says: "Crews operating under the direction of Lieutenant Colonel McKinstry, Corps of Engineers, U. S. A., will survey the principal bars on the Oregon coast during the season so data may be obtained on which to base comparative surveys next season to ascertain improvements in channel depths, and the first work has been started at Nehalem. More men were ordered there to report to William G. Carroll, junior engineer. "The channel inside as well as that across the bar will be sounded and from there the party goes to Tillamook for similar work. Coos Bay and Siuslaw are provided for likewise."
