McDonald & Vaughn Win. The jury in the case of Bolsinger vs. McDonald & Vaughan brought in a verdict for the defense Satin a verdict for the derense sat-urday after being out a short time. en by the former. In his instructions to the jury, Judge Coke held that the employers liability law applied to practically all lines of industry in which ma-chinery is used, the employer being required to see that all safety de-vices possible are provided. The law is a very stringent one.
