MUNICIPAL WHARF.

San Pedro Will Have One of the Finest on Pacific Coast. SAN PEDRO, June 3.—The last piles in the municipal wharf in the outer harbor have been driven by Contractors Snare & Trieste, Repre-sentatives of the contractors announce that they expect to complete their contract by July 1st. The wharf will be one of the best on the Pacific Coast, and when the tracks and sheds for the handling of freight are completed, the freight handling facilities will be second to none on the coast. Over 1200 piles were driven by the contractors to support the reinforced concrete to support the reinforced concrete wharf. All of the piles are reinforced and have been arranged in such a manner that when the concrete floor and concrete stringers are in place the entire wharf will be a solid piece of concrete.
