

RESUME NEW HAVEN CASE

J. S. Elton, Director of Railroad, Takes Stand Before Commerce Commission

(By Associated Press to Coos Bay Times.)
 WASHINGTON, D. C., June 4.—J. S. Elton, a director of the New Haven Railroad, was the first witness yesterday when the inquiry into that system's financial affairs was resumed before the Interstate Commerce Commission. He said he felt the expenditure of \$11,000,000 for the Westchester Railroad was extravagant, but that he had absolute confidence in the judgment of Morgan, Rockefeller and Miller, who recommended the purchase. Elton explained that in most transactions discussed at the board meetings reports were made by the executive committee composed of Morgan, Rockefeller and Brush. "What action did you take as to this case?" he was asked. "I generally accepted them." "Without investigating?" "Well, we usually gave in to Mr. Morgan," said Elton.

VARDMAN ON CANAL TOLLS

ASSAILS PRESIDENT WILSON IN THE SENATE FOR ASKING FOR REPEAL OF THE EXEMPTION CLAUSE OF CANAL ACT.

 WASHINGTON, D. C., June 4.—Senator Vardman, Democrat, assailed President Wilson in the Senate for asking for the repeal of the tolls exemption. "When I heard him address Congress urging the repeal, I was dumbfounded," he said. "I would not believe my ears that one who had approved the various planks in his party's platform, and held up to scorn those who violate party pledges would take such a course. He gave no reason for the appeal. He made no argument for the repeal, but with an assurance unbecoming one so learned, he asked us to yield, right or wrong." Senator Simmons argued that the exemption of American coastwise vessels would be discrimination forbidden by the treaty and unwise as a domestic policy.

TWO KILLED BY MEXICANS

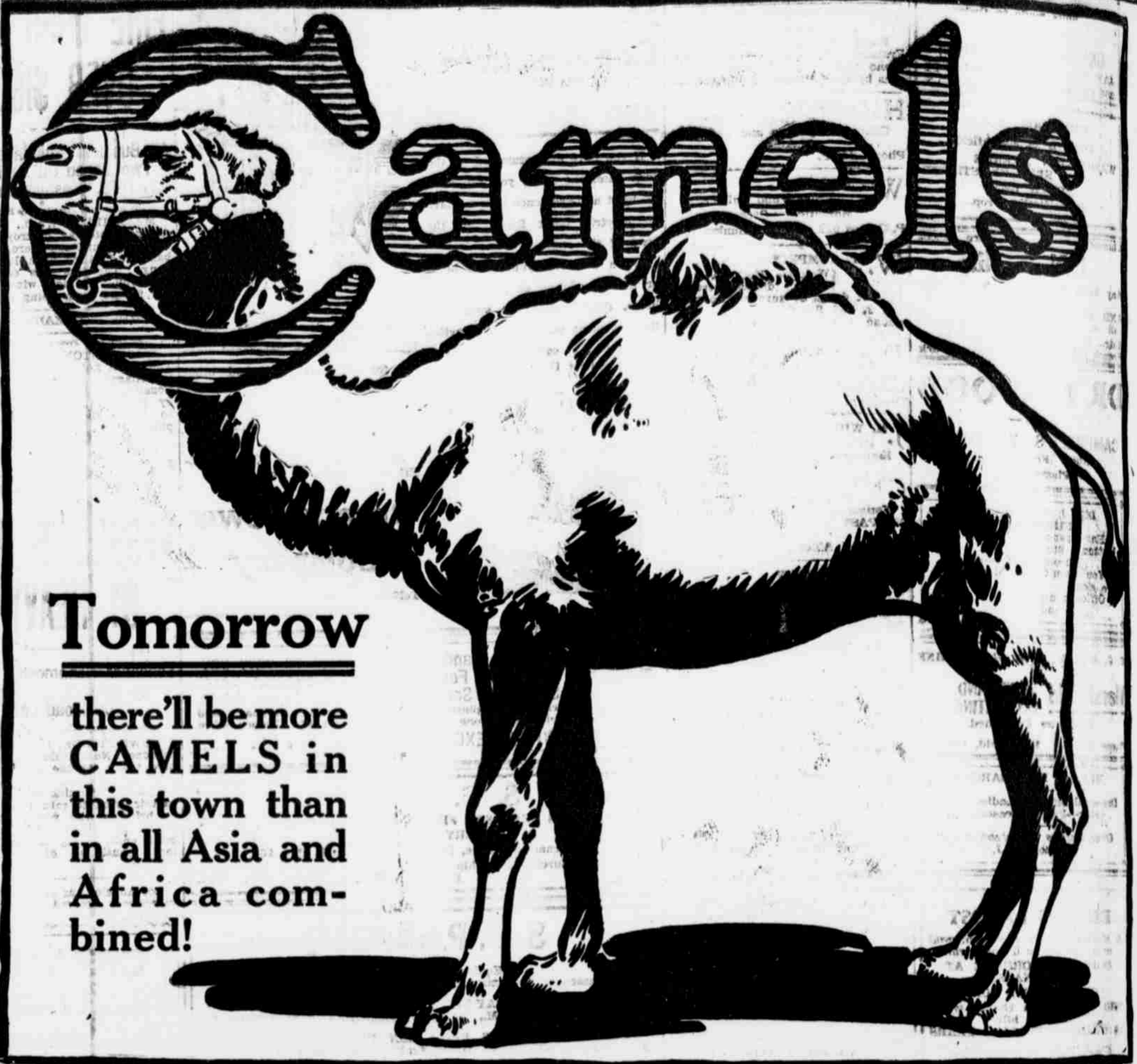
RESOLUTE WINS IN SECOND RACE

Although Only Few Lengths Separate at Finish, She Wins by Good Margin

 ASSOCIATED PRESS BOAT, June 4.—The yacht Resolute defeated the sloop Vanitie this afternoon in the second race, preliminary to selecting America's cup defender. The boats finished close together. Although only a few lengths separated the boats at the finish, the Resolute in reality won by a considerable margin, since she received from her rival time allowance of more than three minutes. After the yachts returned the second time, the Resolute was a few hundred yards to windward, but the Vanities seemed to foot just as fast. Both boats showed great speed, as the wind was true and blowing nearly eight knots.
