BANDON WILL HAVE CAUCUS

Candidates To Be Nominated Tonight for City Election— Wet and Dry Issue

(Special to The Times.)
BANDON, Or., June 5.—A caucus will be held here tonight for the purpose of nominating candidates for the city election. The caucus promises to be rather animated as the "wet" and "dry" issue is being injected into it and probably will be into the city campaign. There are two tickets in the field:

Business Men's Ticket—George P. Topping for mayor; E. B. Kausrud for recorder; J. L. Kronenberg, W. C. Sellmer and F. J. Chatburn for councilmen from the East Ward and Dr. L. P. Dorenson, C. E. Klepper and H. C. Dippel for councilmen from the West Ward.

People's Ticket—Mrs. E. M. Rea for mayor; E. B. Kausrud for recorder; J. H. Gould, S. Mundy and S. E. Hines for councilmen from the East Ward and C. E. Klepper, A. McNair and R. B. Hunsicker for councilmen from the West Ward.

The People's ticket is generally known as the "dry" ticket here and they have circulated a large amount of literature urging the support of their candidates in the caucus tonight.

RAILWAY REPORT.

(From Gardiner Courier.)

The Porter Bros. have built a camp for their teamsters and fly tents for their horses just below town. They have five four-horse teams at work now hauling lumber and material for tunnel 6, and intend to put on several more teams shortly, as they have several hundred thousand feet of lumber to be delivered at the above named tunnel.

Over half of the grading is done between Scofield Creek and the Umpqua River for the railroad. This does not include the grading and filling to

be made for sidetracks and depots. The heavy blasting being done by the graders near Mr. Sherbundy's house is shaking it to pieces, besides the rocks that are being thrown out by the blast do considerable damage. One broke Mr. Sherbundy's separator, one mashed a can of cream, and other rocks are thrown through the buildings, making it rather dangerous to be in them.
