PRIEST WAS BALL PLAYER.

Father Murphy, former Detroit Star, Dies At Baker, Ore.
 BAKER, Or., June 5.—Father J. J. Murphy, a popular Catholic priest of Oregon, formerly a member of the Detroit American League baseball team, died here at forty-three years. From college he went to the major league baseball club, and won honors, later retiring to take up the priesthood. He came to Oregon two years ago.

FIRST FOREST FIRES REPORTED

Some Damage During May Reported in Oregon and Washington.
 PORTLAND, Or., June 5.—While the early forest fires reported in May were mostly in slashings and without loss, June opens the commonly recognized fire season with indications of a dangerous year that demands more than usual precaution, according to bulletins received by the Western Forestry and Conservation Association from all states in the Pacific Northwest. Much less than the usual amount of snow remains in the mountains and in some regions there have already been several weeks of dry weather broken only by one short rain. Atmospheric conditions seem to be conducive to frequent dry interior winds, requiring extraordinary precaution in firing slashings. Patrols are already in the field and being rapidly recruited to their full strength. Unless there shall be rain in June trouble is expected, but the protective organization to meet it will be better than in any past year.
 Washington had fully 100 fires in May, many of them receiving much publicity, but practically all of them were slashings fires more useful than otherwise. About 75 per cent of loggers' slashings are thus cleaned up.
 Oregon has had three or four small slash fires with no damage. The state forester urges continuation of purposeful slash burning, under permit and with full precaution. He has about twenty-six men in the field. Private patrol associations also began work in May and will have 350 men on duty by July 1.

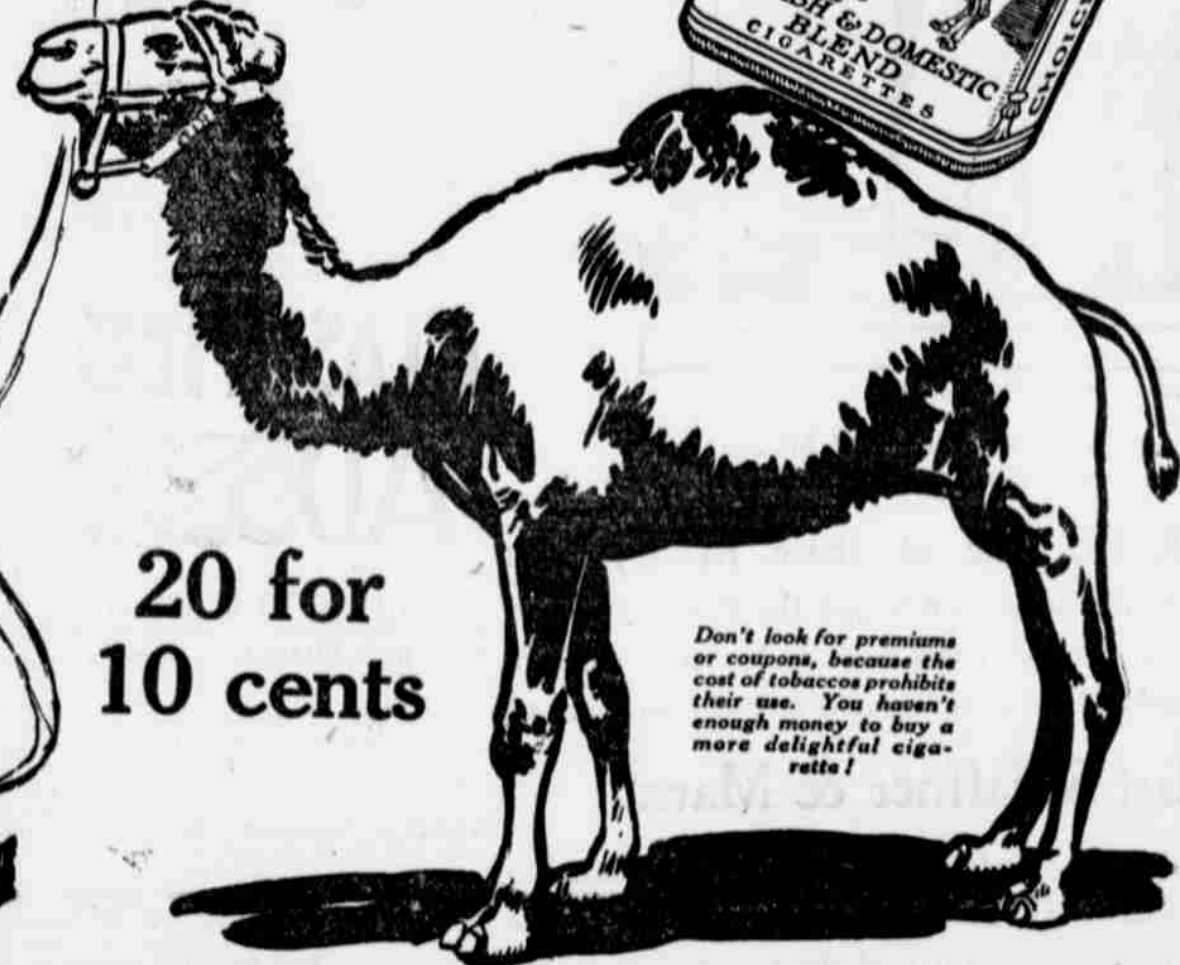

COST OF POLITICS.

Congressman Hawley Spent \$1057 in Primary Campaign.
 SALEM, Or., June 5.—Dr. C. J. Smith, who won the Democratic nomination for Governor, expended \$706.35 in the primary campaign, according to his expense statement filed with Secretary of State Olcott.
 Gus C. Moser, of Portland, who was a candidate for the Republican nomination, expended \$742.26.
 Other candidates filing expense statements were: W. C. Hawley, Republican candidate for Congress, First District, \$1057.72.
