REHEARING IN
BARTON CASE

DISTRICT ATTORNEY BROWN
SAYS SUPREME COURT WAS
MISINFORMED ABOUT TRIAL
AT COQUILLE.

The Coquille Sentinel says: District Attorney Liljeqvist says he has consulted his predecessor in office, George W. Brown, as to the Barton case, and it has been decided to ask a rehearing. As Mr. Brown's statements to the jury are one of the grounds given for a reversal in this case, he will make the argument for the rehearing on the claim that he is not guilty of such errors in the trial as have been charged, and that the Supreme Court was 'misinformed' as to the occurrences during the trial in the Circuit Court here.

There is some talk of change of venue in the case of the state vs. J. S. Barton, when it is tried again. District Attorney Liljeqvist thinks that in case of a retrial it will be much more expensive to secure a jury here than to take the witnesses to another county. Owing to the interest excited in regard to it, and it might take a week or more to rake and scrape for one. If the case is taken out of the county it will probably go out of the judicial district and be tried by a new judge.

FORD SELLS MARKET.
A deal was closed Wednesday whereby Gus Resky has bought the interest of J. E. Ford in the Bandoa Meat Market, and is now sole proprietor of the same. Mr. Resky was formerly connected with this market. —Bandon Recorder.

WORK ON SIUSLAW.
The amount of rock delivered at the jetty during the month of May was over 12,000 tons. This is a record delivery. Work is now progressing nicely and has been advanced about 100 feet beyond where it was when the jetty was damaged by the Frederick. —Florence Pilot.

PLANK FLORENCE STREET.
Monday night at the regular meeting of the City Council Wm. Kyle appeared and asked that the property owners on Front street between Washington and Jefferson be given permission to improve this street by planking. Tuesday morning the city engineer began the work of establishing grade stakes and the planking will be graded by a force of men as soon as the preliminary work will permit. —Florence Pilot.

PUT IN FINE HOME.
Government Fixes Up Residence of Heceta Head Keeper.
The Florence Pilot says: J. A. Laughhead, representing the construction department of the Lighthouse Service, is at Heceta Head improving and completing the water and sewer system for the government buildings. The keepers' residences are being piped for hot and cold water and lavatories, making them modern in this respect. Mr. Laughhead has been at work about a week now and will probably be a couple of months yet at the job. The homes of the light keepers and the tower is situated at a point on Heceta Head overlooking the coos and are supplied with spring water for drinking and household purposes. Capt. O. L. Hansen is head keeper and he and his family have lived there for many years.

NEWS OF GLENADA.
Events of Lower Siuslaw As Told by the Florence Pilot.
Frank Knowles has started the erection of a cement block building on Viola avenue. It will be two stories; 28x60. The citizens of Glenada held a mass meeting Tuesday night to make arrangements for a Fourth of July celebration.

It is reported that S. E. Lowe has set out 1047 cabbage plants. George H. Colter has started the erection of a building just east of Frank Knowles' store to be two stories high, 32x60, and will face on the planked county road. The lower room is rented and will be occupied by a gent's furnishing store and drug store. The upper story will be cut up into four three-room apartments. The plank roadway is being extended from Lake street to Maple and is now ready for the covering. It will be sixteen feet wide. The shingle mill started up Friday and tried out the machinery. Everything seems to be working good and this week will see the mill operating. The capacity of the mill is 40,000. This mill is owned and operated by local capital under the firm name of the Glenada Manufacturing Company. Grant Colter will erect a garage and repair shop soon. A building 18x30 is being erected on the east side of the wharf for Dave Brennan, who will run a cigar store and soft drink establishment.
