SALEM, Or., June 9.—State For-ester F. A. Elliott is sending letters to all his supervising wardens out over the state, requesting them to im-mediately submit a list of road supervisors or other persons interested in the protection of the timber of the state for appointment as fire wardens, to serve during the closed fire season, which began June 1. One of the chief duties of such wardens is to issue burning permits for the burning of slashings and to keep an eye on such fires. Last year 275 road supervisors were appointed wardens, and this year it is expected to appoint 350, besides 75 to 100 volun-
