Leaves Soon.—C. A. Smith is planning to leave on the next Breakwater for Portland and northern points on business.

Need Sewers.—Dr. Straw has informed the City Council that they will provide a sewage system for the district south of Hall avenue, including South First street, South Broadway, some houses on Hall avenue and some on South Fourth street. He says that the present conditions are a menace to the health and something will have to be done quickly.

Go to Gold Beach.—Lynn Lambeth's auto left the Chandler Hotel at 7:30 this morning with six passengers for Port Orford, Gold Beach and intermediate territory. Those going were Mr. and Mrs. Don Gardner, Archie Johnston, Eugene Crosthwaite, Clifford Leonard, the typewriter man, and T. L. Botsford, the tie contractor.

Inspect Roads.—Judge Hall, Commissioners Armstrong and Dement, and County Roadmaster P. M. Hall-Lewis are now making their annual inspection of roads. An automobile is being used and enables them to cover the districts in a fraction of the time it formerly required.

Auto Accident Reported.—It was rumored this morning that Roy Ruffner, a local automobile driver, met with an accident while en route to Bandon late yesterday evening. The report cannot be confirmed and it is not thought that anything serious has happened to Ruffner.

Wins Prize.—Taggart Ashton, the engineer who was here for a time a couple of years ago on an electric line project from Coos Bay to Roseburg, was recently awarded a special \$1000 prize in an engineering competition for the best plans for a canal subdivision of Richmond, Calif.

Name Docks.—The new warehouse and docks being put in by the C. A. Smith company on the waterfront will be named the "Smith Terminal Docks." For years the old dock and warehouse has been known as the Alliance dock, but the name will change with the transfer of the Alliance to another run and the erection of the new buildings.

On Mud Flat.—Last evening Al Smith's launch landed far up on the mud flat. It was being run by Mr. Smith's son and a son of Jess Smith. The boys when they discovered they could not get off, waded out across the mud flat nearly a mile to the shore and then walked up Coos River until they caught a boat. Mr. Smith became alarmed and came to Marshfield to search for them. Most of the cargo of malt from the North Bend Brewery was lost.

Forced to Pay Board.—John Murphy, aged sixty-seven, an old soldier who is receiving a pension of \$90 a month, was arrested yesterday evening by Constable Cox on a complaint filed by P. N. Thurston, who claimed that he had been caring for Murphy and that he owed him \$65 for room and board, which he refused to pay. Murphy spent the night in the city jail and this morning decided to come to terms with Thurston, who agreed to accept \$50 as a compromise.
