For Women and the Home WOMEN'S CLUBS DISCUSS DRESS

CHICAGO, Ill., June 12.—An important innovation in women's clubs meetings will occur when the biennial convention of the General Federation of Women's Club, which met here June 9 and continues to June 19 will take up the subject of women's dress. The matter will come up in a conference upon the relation of the club to the community when a resolution will be presented concerning the subject of dress. Mrs. Mary I. Wood, of Portsmouth, N. H., head of the bureau of information, has written the following letter to all presidents of clubs affiliated with the general federation: "Over and over again, especially during the past twelve months, the subject of women's dress has been brought to my attention. Women have written to me, both personally and as manager of the bureau of information of the general federation of women's clubs, complaining that they were unable any longer to buy skirts which did not hinder locomotion; men have stopped me on the street to call to my attention some particular noticeable costume (one of those which covered everything and concealed nothing) and have asked if there was not something that could be done about it; social workers have discussed in my presence the effect which dress has upon morals; advocates of the dance have urged that proper dressing would go far toward overcoming the evils of improper dancing; these and many others have brought the matter to my attention and each and all with the request that the club women take some action in the matter. "Influenced by these things and moved by my own observation, I am led to ask myself and the club women at large if the matter is not one in which we are vitally concerned. We are recognized as the vital thinking force among the American women; is it not time that we should cease to adopt and countenance styles
