# BUSINESS MEN STARTED EARLY

### Messrs. Mendel, Westerburg and Copple Among First to Reach Burning Town

Probably the first party to leave for Bandon yesterday morning following the receipt of the news that the business district of the town was burning consisted of A. J. Mendel, E. Westerberg, R. A. Copple, Ben Ostlund and George Laird, the latter a Bandon business man.

"We were notified about 5 o'clock yesterday morning and in less than an hour we were on our way to Bandon," said Mr. Copple. "If I am not mistaken we were at least an hour ahead of any other auto party. The fire was burning fiercely when we arrived and it was some time before it was under control."

F. E. Westerberg, of the People's 5, 10 and 15 cent store, said that all of the Marshfield business men who had interest in Bandon escaped without loss. Some of the Bandon business men who sustained heavy losses are talking of rebuilding already, he said.

It is reported that Captain Johnson, of the Lifesaving Station, owner of the old bank building, is contemplating a new structure within the near future. The bank building was right in the midst of the fire and was almost a total loss. The damage is estimated at \$3000.

Several persons returning from the scene of the fire last evening, told of the strenuous work of the fire department in attempting to save the burning buildings. They say they were badly handicapped for the lack of fire apparatus and by a heavy wind which spread the fire from roof to roof.


Automobile drivers say that the road between here and Bandon is in fairly good condition. Every automobile in last evening was covered with mud and showed evidences of a hard grind through the country.

# BANDON CITY TICKET FILED

### Geo. P. Topping, Geo. J. Armstrong and J. Nielson Will Contest for Mayoralty

The Bandon mass meeting for the nomination of candidates for city officers brought out about 200 people, and though there was much spirit shown, everything went off quietly.

F. J. Chaburn was chairman and C. R. Moore, secretary.

For Mayor the names of Geo. P. Topping, Geo. J. Armstrong, John Nielson and J. W. Mast were presented.

For Recorder the names of E. B. Kaurud and B. N. Harrington were proposed.

On the first ballot Geo. P. Topping received 89 votes, Geo. J. Armstrong 36, John Nielson 36 and J. W. Mast 25. Mr. Topping was then declared nominated and a second ballot was taken to vote off the tie between Armstrong and Nielson, the ballot resulting in 107 for Armstrong and 81 for Nielson.

The meeting then adjourned and the voters of the east ward went to the fire hall where they nominated Councilmen, while the west ward remained at the opera house.

The west ward named Dr. L. P. Sorensen, H. C. Dippel, C. E. Klepper and A. McNair for the long term and Steve Gallier and John Shields for the short term.

In the east ward F. J. Chaburn and S. Mundy were nominated for the long term and C. R. Moore, J. W. Mast, J. H. Gould and S. E. Hines for the short term.

On Saturday afternoon petitions with the required number of names were filed with the City Recorder, demanding the name of John Nielson be placed on the ticket for Mayor and C. H. Hurley for Councilman for the short term, therefore these names will appear in addition to the nominees of the caucus.—Bandon Recorder.
