MITCHIE WILL RETURN SOON

Expect Bar Dredge to Leave Portland Saturday—More Repairs Made.

Henry Sengstacken returned yesterday from Portland on the Geo. W. Elder, having attended the annual meeting of the Oregon Association of Title Men, which was held on June 12th and 13th. He reports the meeting well attended. It wound up with a banquet at the Portland Commercial Club. A. A. Lee, of the Salem Abstract Co., was elected president and M. H. Stevenson of the Washington County Abstract Company secretary and treasurer. He met Capt. Reed of the dredge Michie who reports that the dredge will be ready to return to Coos Bay by Saturday. She will have a new drag of lighter weight than the original one, which will make her handle better with the present power. The extra delay was caused by her new propeller and new plates—the former had to be cast in San Francisco. It is reported that the contractors will not make any money on the repair job, the contract price being about \$2300. He says the Geo. W. Elder is a fine passenger boat and he hopes to see enough business in and out of Coos Bay to warrant her remaining on the Coos Bay-Portland-Eureka run.

PROHIBITIONIST SEES SOLUTION

Liquor Question Can Be Settled Only by Combining Forces, He Says.

Worendyke of Los Angeles in an address at the National Conference of the leaders of the prohibition party here. "Prohibition awaits the administration of the government by the political party that believes in it at reform. It is impossible otherwise."

Prominent North Bend Woman Elected to School Board There—Other Districts

Mrs. C. E. Winsor, a prominent North Bend woman, was elected director there to fill the vacancy on the board caused by the retirement of L. F. Falkenstein, who refused to be a candidate for re-election. Mrs. Winsor has been a leading worker in public affairs at North Bend. At the election she received 88 votes and A. H. Imhoff 44 votes. C. E. Mayhew was re-elected clerk over A. H. Derbyshire by a vote of 78 to 52. Buckler Hill District. H. M. Albee was re-elected director and A. L. Ruiz clerk at the Buckler Hill district last night. J. Rossadahl and J. E. Brockmiller are the other members of the board. Millington District. E. M. Smith was elected director and C. H. Coddling clerk at the Millington district election. Mrs. Margeau Chosen. Mrs. C. J. Margeau, wife of Capt. Margeau, of the Breakwater, was elected a member of the school board at Empire, succeeding Wm. Saunderson. Mrs. Margeau is now a member of the City Council at Empire. Postville Election. M. A. McLaugon, of Postville, was elected a member of the school board there. Mrs. McLaugon was elected clerk of the board, defeating Mrs. J. A. Swanson.

G. W. KAUFMAN IS DIRECTOR

Prominent Young Business Man Unanimously Chosen—Hall Is Clerk Again

G. W. Kaufman was unanimously elected a member of the Marshfield school board last evening to succeed J. C. Merchant, who declined to serve again. Mr. Kaufman was the only candidate nominated and his election was by acclamation. His name was placed in nomination by I. S. Smith, who paid tribute to the excellent qualifications of Mr. Kaufman for the place and stated that the community and the schools were lucky to get men of his ability and standing to devote their time to public affairs. Judge John F. Hall was re-elected clerk of the district by unanimous vote. He has served about twenty years in this position. The meeting was called to order about 7:45. There were about twenty present and owing to it being unanimous, the business was quickly transacted. Just as the voting was closing the George W. Elder whistled into her dock and the crowd rushed away to see the vessel. In consequence the election was ordered closed. Many thought that the meeting would last until 8 o'clock and a score or more came late, only to find the school house vacant.

GEO. W. ELDER IS INSPECTED

New Freight and Passenger Steamer Arrived Last Evening—Went South Today

The passenger and freight steamer George W. Elder, of the North Pacific Steamship Company, arrived at the Alliance dock at 7:45 o'clock last evening. She was all dressed up and ready for inspection as soon as her gang plank was in position. Hundreds of people lined the water front as the big steamer moved toward the dock and not many left until they had inspected the vessel from topmast to boiler room. About forty-one passengers were on board the George W. Elder on her first trip here from Portland, as well as a number of officials of the North Pacific Steamship Company. Charles P. Doe, president of the company; E. G. McMicklin, general passenger agent; E. B. Freyer, traveling freight and passenger agent; and O. S. Lofsted were among the officers on the steamer. They were met at North Bend by W. H. Peters and C. F. McGeorge. The George W. Elder will inaugurate a new twenty-four hour service between Portland and Coos Bay. She will leave Portland every Sunday morning at 9 a. m., arriving here every Monday morning. After making the trip to Eureka she will sail for Portland on Thursdays.
