**ADMINISTRATION FORCES WIN OVER INSURGENTS IN CONVENTION OF MODERN WOODMEN OF AMERICA AT TOLEDO.**

## Health Hints

### BATHING.

**Not Only a Necessity to Good Health, but a Real Luxury in Right Living.** (By Dr. R. R. Daniels.)

In spite of the contention of some of our health writers that man is a land animal and should use water on the body sparingly, there is no question that in almost every person a tepid sponge bath every day and one or two hot baths a week or retiring are conducive to bodily vigor and energy and to disease-resisting power.

The skin is not merely a mechanical covering for the body. It is one of the most important body organs. Its chief functions being to assist in carrying away the body waste, and to regulate the heat production in the body so as to meet the body needs in changing temperature. Those who are "bilious," or subject to colds, coughs, nervousness and rheumatism and who "feel" the cold of winter and the heat of summer have a sluggish skin which fails to perform its proper functions.

**Active Skin Must Have Daily Care.**

To keep the skin active it must have daily care. A thorough rubbing of the skin with a moderately coarse towel or a soft flesh brush following a sponging of the body with tepid water will open up the millions of tiny pores, and increase the skin activity in carrying off the body waste. Except in the unusually robust, cold water should not be used on the skin; the shock is too great. While it may invigorate temporarily, it tends to deplete the nerve energy and to result in nervous exhaustion.

The best time for the sponge bath is on rising, but it can be taken in the evening. In addition to the daily sponge bath one or two hot baths a week with soap are necessary for cleanliness.
