**If You Fall Overboard**

AND CAN'T SWIM READ HERE JUST WHAT TO DO—CUT THIS OUT FOR FUTURE REFERENCE

THE unusual number of fatalities on Coos Bay resulting from accidentally drownings prompts The Times to print the following advice from an expert on what to do in an emergency:

In reply to the question as to what one who cannot swim should do if he falls into the water when there is no assistance at hand, William H. Dally, champion life saver of the United States, once said: "When one falls into the water the weight of the body will force it under the water at first, but it will rise again if the mouth is kept shut. When you are under the water clasp your hands behind your back squaring your elbows so as to balance the floating body, and you will rise to the surface on your back and float until help reaches you or until you starve, as long as you keep your hands in that position. The hands clasped and placed on the back of the neck is an equally good position."

**Industrial Review of the State**

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NEW FACTORIES, IMPROVEMENTS AND ENTERPRISES THAT INCREASE THE PAYROLLS AND PROMOTE THE DEVELOPMENT OF OREGON.

The Oregon Public Utilities Commission has increased telephone rates at Newberg, and in the Eugene electric power case, sustains the contention of the Oregon Power Company.

The manufacture of loganberry juice and sawdust briquets are new industries being considered in various parts of the state.

Hood River county will vote on a \$75,000 bond issue for the Columbia Highway.

Sellwood is to have the first wing of a large hospital built.

Mercy Hospital, Eugene, will build a \$15,000 training school.

Clackamas county will establish a sand and gravel plant at New Era.

Maupin is to have a new \$15,000 bank building.

The Langreel, Baker County, sawmill will be located on Burnt River.

The State Grange bulletin says not one person in a hundred will pay anything but a land tax if the \$1500 exemption passes.

Albany will have a \$50,000 school erected this year.

Eugene is laying 21,600 feet of water main extensions.

Charles Bardeaux of the American Brewing Company of Baker has been looking up a location at Fort George, B. C.

Marshfield voted \$15,000 for a high school gymnasium.

The Oregon Power company has 100 men at work extending its intake for the Springfield water supply.

Cannery, cannery, is the cry of the Albany business men.

The Portland Central Labor Council is agitating an initiative bill to annul the franchises of the Portland Gas and Coke Company which the legislature refused to repeal.

Milwaukie will get a dollar gas rate from the Portland Gas Co.

Independent bar pilots have reduced rates from \$1.50 to \$1.00 per foot draft for vessels.

Dallas voted fair grounds and septic tank bonds.

Lane county hop crop this year will be \$350,000.

Albany loganberry drier handled 8000 pounds a day.

Eola will have a \$5000 church.

The 1914 wool crop brought Oregon \$2,080,000.

Mrs. Hogue will build a \$200,000 hotel at Eleventh and Washington streets, Portland.

Cottage Grove has lowered its school tax 5 1/2 mills.

By a vote of 12 to 1 Portland voters defeated free textbooks. The industry of state published textbooks to be established next year.

The new quarter of a million feet a day elm-tile sawmill of the Booth-Kelly Co. at Springfield was given a trial the past week.

Under the head of a state industrial survey the water power in the Rogue River is to be investigated with a view to putting the state into the business of generating electric power.

Astoria is to have the most powerful wireless telegraph station.

A franchise has been granted the Pacific Power & Light Company to build four miles of street car line in Clatsop county running from Astoria.

Porter Brothers expect to add 800 men to their force on the Tallcoos Lake section of the Willamette Pacific, south of Florence.

Portland municipal dock No. 1 will be enlarged to hold two large ships at the same time.

The Socialist party is initiating a bill to tax estates and create a fund for the unemployed, to be administered by the State Labor Commissioner, authorized to build railroads and public works of all kinds.

**NEWS OF NEARBY TOWNS**

**ELKTON HOME BURNS.**

The beautiful farm residence of Mr. and Mrs. August Dignant, of Elkton, burned to the ground, according to word received here. Mr. and Mrs. Dignant were at Eugene at the time and knew nothing of the fire until a message was sent to them there. The residence was only recently erected and cost in the neighborhood of \$2000. There was no insurance.—Roseburg Review.

**SUSLAW BAR DEEPER.**

**Sausalito Takes Out Cargo of 400 Feet.**

The Florence Pilot says: What supposed to be the largest load ever carried by the schooner Sausalito from the Siuslaw River, was successfully taken over the bar Monday evening.

The tug Roberts came up from Gardiner, where she had taken the barge Lawrence and found fourteen feet and six inches of water on the bar. Without even stopping to say hello to his friends who were watching on the wharf, Captain Jones got a towline on the schooner and started for the river and within two hours was back at the dock, having taken the schooner out, drawing over twelve feet of water.

One good feature of the Siuslaw bar is that it has maintained about fourteen feet of water for some time now, with no variation in depth, and seems to be slowly deepening. The schooner's load was estimated at very close to 450,000 feet.

The Oakland is now being loaded and it is expected that she will carry out nearly 500,000 feet of lumber.
