All Over Oregon

SALEM.—Attorney General A. M. Crawford has accepted an invitation to deliver the address at the Fourth of July celebration at Sherwood, Oregon.

GRANTS PASS—D. H. Miller, of New York is in the city to look after the interest of the estate of Arnold Becker, the mining engineer who took his own life at Holland last winter.

EUGENE—A. Scheinforth, ticket agent of the Southern Pacific station, has returned from Seattle, accompanied by Mrs. Scheinforth. They were married in Salem last Friday.

GRANTS PASS—Robert G. Smith of Grants Pass, one of the best-known Democrats and attorneys in the state, is being threatened with disbarment proceedings as a result of troubles in the Cleopatra Development Company.

SALEM—Ethel Barton was given a decree of divorce from T. A. Barton day before yesterday on a charge of desertion. Ethel Barton was awarded the custody of the minor child. Both are well known in local circles.

RAINIER—The City Council here, like at Coquille, has refused to renew the licenses of the five saloons. One of the saloons is making a test case by trying to enjoin the city officials from closing the place and thus carrying it into the courts.

EUGENE—The Eugene Chautauqua opened Wednesday with a special program of events arranged for each day of the six-day assembly. Saturday is designated as music day because there are no lectures either in the afternoon or evening.

EUGENE—Fire Chief C. F. Croner, with a clear record of three years of service, tendered his resignation. Lack of harmony in the force is said to be the cause. The Council is considering a man to fill the vacancy.

EUGENE—The Radiators will probably not attend the cherry fair at Salem this year, which will be held on June 25, 26 and 27, according to L. L. Lewis, president. No other trips by the Radiators are planned this year.

EUGENE—After apparently ignoring for over a year the notice of the city council that it had been operating without a franchise, the City Council has ordered the Postal Telegraph Company in Eugene to remove its poles.

ROSEBURG—Mrs. H. C. Kinney, Paul Kinney and Mr. and Mrs. C. H. Woodward arrived the other day from Pomona, California. They left the latter city last Tuesday and traveled the thousand miles by automobile.

GRANTS PASS—The park commission, which has charge of the parks of the city, finds itself short of funds on account of having to take charge of the railroad parks on F street, and they have decided to sell roses to help defray expenses.

MEDFORD—A. S. Rosenbaum, local agent for the Southern Pacific, and general manager of the Hartman interests in the Rogue River Valley, has closed twenty-five years of faithful and efficient service for the Espee. He started as a telegrapher.

MEDFORD—Silk valued at \$250 and estimated at 250 yards, has disappeared from the shelves of the M. & M. Department Store, furnishing one of the most baffling theft mysteries the police authorities have ever contended with.

MEDFORD—James King, snake charmer for the Foley and Burk Carnival, who was bitten by a "Gila Monster" during a performance, is resting easily at the Sacred Heart Hospital. King was a former Central Point boy.

EUGENE—W. H. Paslay, living ten miles west of Eugene, is the owner of a six-footed pig. The young pig is lively as any of the other members of his family, but he does not make actual use of his extra pedal facilities.

EUGENE—If Eugene can offer power at one cent per kilowatt hour during the period of offload, S. A. Buck will commence the immediate construction of a \$25,000 manufacturing plant at High street and the railroad track, where he holds a lease on property formerly held by the Standard Oil Co. The power companies believe suitable arrangements are possible.
