

LIMIT SPEED IN EASTSIDE

Council Will Adopt Ordinance Similar to Marshfield—New Street to Ferry

The Eastside City Council at its last meeting decided to put a damper on the speed artists there and instructed City Attorney George Watkins to draft a speed ordinance similar to the Marshfield city ordinance.

Recently a number of complaints had been made about autoists and motorcycleists hitting up a speed that was dangerous to pedestrians. The Council decided to call a halt on it.

To Change Ferry.
It was decided to have a meeting early next week and complete plans for starting the improvement of McKay street. The notice on the street has been up for the required thirty days and bids on the work will probably be called next week.

They hope to get the street completed out to the ferry landing by early fall so that the ferry transit can be changed. This will be one of the biggest benefits that Eastside has ever enjoyed and with the improved ferry service, it is expected that it will mean that many Marshfield people will make their homes there.

To Get Crossing.
Steps to secure the crossing for Ferry street in Marshfield over the Southern Pacific tracks are being taken. The street crossing will be only about fifty feet wide, the same

as the street deeded by C. A. Smith. Owing to the many concessions that the Southern Pacific has received in Marshfield, it is not believed that they can reasonably oppose the project. It was stated that they were putting in switches where the crossing would be, evidently intending to try and use the street crossing to trade in an effort to get rid of the Marshfield franchise.

S. O. COMPANY HELD MEETING

Directors Are Elected for En- suing Year—Wait Settle- ment of Government Case

At the annual meeting of the Southern Oregon company at Empire yesterday little was done except to elect directors. It was stated that until the government's suit to cancel the patents to the old Coos Bay Wagon Road Grant, which the company holds, are settled, little can be done by the company.

The company is now controlled by C. R. Smith of the Menasha Woodens-ware Company. Its holdings in Coos county total over 105,000 acres. Dorsey Kreitzer, cashier of the First National Bank of Marshfield, was elected director to represent the minority stockholders.

The other directors represent Mr. Smith's holdings and they are C. R. Smith, H. S. Smith, Herbert Armstrong, C. G. Hockett, Fred Getty and George Gothro.

The officers will be elected by the directors the second Thursday in July.

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EXTENSION OF TIME REFUSED

Water Company Will Not be Favored, at Present Time at Least, About Pipe Change

At a special meeting of the City Council yesterday afternoon it was decided to refuse the water company an extension of time at this time in which to make changes in various pipelines. It was also decided to deny the water company the right to put the new reservoir at the location of number 3 rather than number 4. City Attorney Goss was instructed to draw up resolutions accordingly, which will be passed on at the next meeting of the City Council.

Councillman Copple held that the reservoir should be at the highest elevation possible. At the council meeting last Monday night the water company requested that the council stand with the company in placing pipe lines on different streets from those selected by the Railroad Commission.

R. H. Corey, general manager of the water company, was the official representative of the company at the meeting.
