BOSSEN IS ACQUITTED.
Springfield Man Found Not Guilty on Poisoning Charge.
EUGENE, Or., June 29.—After a trial that lasted six days, the jury in the case of Andrew Bossen, charged with murdering his wife, Edith Bossen, at their home on the night of March 19, last, returned a verdict of not guilty.

The Bossens came to Springfield a little over a year ago from Elkton, Douglas county, Oregon. Evidence in the case was entirely circumstantial, Bossen being accused of administering the poison during the absence of the other members of the household. Bossen is a timber cruiser and his parents live near Langlois, Curry county.

Elks Use Four Pitchers in Game at North Bend—Mill Team Wins From Libby

With two double plays to their credit, the Moose Baseball team defeated the Elk team by a score of 17 to 10 on the North Bend diamond yesterday afternoon. The Moose team scored three runs in the first inning, five in the fourth, seven in the eighth and two in the ninth.

The Elks scored two in the first inning, one in the fourth, two in the fifth, three in the seventh and two in the ninth.

Howatt, Stevenson, Morse and James pitched for the Elks, with Catterlin behind the bat. C. Langworthy and McLain were the battery for the Moose team. Howatt had pitched five innings when he was replaced by James. In the last half of the sixth inning James sprained a tendon in the calf of his right leg while making a run for first base and could not finish. Howatt again took the mound in the seventh, but fearing that he would strain his arm he gave way to Stevenson, who had been playing first. Stevenson pitched the seventh inning and was succeeded in the eighth by Morse.

The Moose team made a double play in the seventh inning and closed the game with another. Catterlin, who caught for the Elks, and Howatt, who pitched, tried to catch a pop-up in the seventh inning. They collided with each other about midway between home plate and third base and the ball handuffed both of them. Langworthy, who caught for the Moose team, caught a hot one hit by Catterlin in the second inning.

There were a number of good plays on the part of both teams and it is needless to say there were a good many errors. Some of the decisions of Umpire Lillebo were sharply questioned by both players and spectators, but he held his ground in the belief that he was right.

With the exception of the change in the pitching staff of the Elk team there was but one other change. That came when Archie Johnston replaced Don Gardner on second base in the seventh inning. Although Archie had little opportunity to show his ability as a ball player, the crowd did not fail to note that he is a good coacher.
