CLOSE CALL OF A BANDON MAN

Bullet Crashes Through Auto Windshield and Glances on Steering Wheel

W. F. Harmon returned last evening from a business trip to Bandon and states that there has been quite a furor there over a shooting case that is a decided mystery. Monday morning about 9 o'clock, as Joe Fish was driving Charles Jamieson's car through the suburbs, a bullet crashed through the windshield and striking one of the spokes in the steering wheel glanced off. Fish was alone in the car at the time and the variation of an inch in the course of the bullet would have meant that it would have struck him in the chest. Owing to the noise the auto was making, Fish did not hear the shot and he did not realize how close it came to killing him until he examined the wheel and saw the mark of the steel-capped bullet. Whether it was a deliberate attempt to kill Fish or whether it was a stray bullet, they do not know. Fish says that he does not know of anyone who would attempt to kill him.

LIVELY NIGHT AT COQUILLE

Closing Hours of Saloon There Last Night—Council Remains Firm

Parties coming from Coquille today report that the closing hours of the saloons there last night were very lively. Contrary to the expectations, there was no "free booze" but many bought heavily in anticipation of the "drought." The saloons closed at midnight and will remain closed pending legal action. Monday night the Coquille Council met and rejected the petition of the liquor men asking for a reconsideration of the refusal to renew licenses, urging that the saloons be allowed to continue under license until the November election. The petition was signed by 400 and the Council then had it checked up. John Leneve represented the liquor men and H. O. Anderson the drys. About sixty had signed both petitions and after checking them over and eliminating all names that were objected to were stricken off both petitions, leaving the drys with 480 and the wets with 327. This made over 800 names of voters and this was thought too many. However, the Council voted unanimously not to issue any saloon licenses.

COMPETITIVE BIDS HEARD

Warren Construction Company Favored at Meeting of North Bend City Council

At a meeting of the North Bend City Council last night competitive bids for street improvements were submitted by several contractors. The principal contract was let to the Warren Construction Company, for the paving of Sherman avenue from California to the Park. The company agreed to cover the street with 5-inch bitulithic at \$1.88 a yard. The Council adopted a resolution favoring their bid and another resolution which calls for the laying of a sewer on the same thoroughfare. An ordinance for the issuance and sale of improvement bonds was also read and passed. The greater part of the session was taken up in discussing the advisability of establishing a sewer district taking in the streets between Commercial avenue and the north line of Florida avenue. No definite action was taken, however. All Councilmen were present with the exception of Hollister and Bartle, who are in California. Mayor Simpson presided. Many citizens were there to hear the discussions.

MOTORCYCLISTS SHOW INTEREST

ISAAC R. TOWER REPORTS THAT ENTRIES ARE COMING IN FOR BIG FOURTH OF JULY MOTORCYCLE RACE.

Isaac R. Tower reports that entries are fast coming in for the big motorcycle race which takes place on the afternoon of July 3rd. The motorcyclists are taking a keen interest in this contest and every rider is going out to win. This race will undoubtedly be the biggest thriller of the celebration, as when the machines come down the home stretch on Fourth street they will roar past the crowd at better than sixty miles an hour. The course runs past the Masonic Temple out Fourth street to Johnson avenue and thence out through Reynolds Addition over the old Coquille road and turns back through Flagstaff and Bunker Hill to Marshfield and finishes down Fourth street at the Masonic Temple. The machines will be started in pairs, one minute apart, and each rider timed. Every precaution will be taken to keep the course thoroughly patrolled during the race and the assistance of everyone is asked in seeing that there is no crowding on to or crossing the course during the progress of the race. Entries for this contest are to

close tomorrow night and all motorcyclists wishing to enter are requested to do so at The Gunery as early as possible.

The purse will be \$50 for the fastest time; \$30 for the second and \$20 for the third.
