

## ALL AWAITING CELEBRATION

Auto Parade, Field and Water Sports Big Features—Boat Races Announced

With flags and bunting waving over every street in the business section of the city, Marshfield extends a welcome to the hundreds of visitors who are coming in from all parts of the county to participate in the two-day celebration. Everything is in readiness and the only individual who can put a damper on the festivities is old Juke Plavus.

Every member of the Fourth of July committee is actively engaged in promoting his respective event in the program. It is generally conceded that the program is the most diversified one ever arranged for the Fourth of July. It begins with a band concert by the Coos Bay Concert Band on Thursday evening and ends with a grand display of fireworks on the Eastside waterfront Saturday night.

The automobile parade will be one of the most attractive features of the whole affair and in order that it may be pulled off without a hitch, Manager George Goodrum requests all the participants to be at the assembling point at 9:30 sharp on the morning of July 3. There will be over 100 cars in line with a space of 50 feet between each machine. Most of the machines are being decorated at Goodrum's garage. Koonitz, too, is attending to many of the machines and some beautiful floats will be turned out.

A beautifully decorated float will be provided by the Fourth of July committee, as well as the regal robes to be worn by the Goddess of Liberty in her car of state with her maids of honor. Miss Emma Erikson, the Goddess, has invited Miss MacDonalda, Miss Seafie, Miss Roddy and Miss Flanagan to be her maids of honor. All have accepted the invitation except Miss Flanagan. She is ill with measles.

**Field Sports.**  
The field and water sports committee has settled every detail in that part of the program. The swimming races will be held at the foot of Central avenue and the spectators will find a good vantage point on the Smith dock. The high diving stunts will also be pulled off at the foot of Central avenue. Preble and Kelly, who will perform the surfboard act, will start near Ferndale and after making a flying trip to the foot of Market street they will then play between Market and the Libby coal bunkers.

**Boat Races.**  
John C. Kendall, who is looking after the boat racing events, says there will be races on both days. On the morning of the third there will be a race for Class B speed boats, with something over five entries. \$25 will be divided among the contestants according to the number of entries. Following that race there will be a race between cabin launchers. A prize of \$25 will go to the winner.

The big race will be on the morning of the Fourth, when Class A speedboats will be entered. Among the entries already signed up are the General, owned by A. H. Powers, the Sealed owned by John Lapp, the Auto, owned by Anson Rogers and the Pronto, owned by Jack Harris. J. L. Koonitz and Ray Kaufman are planning to enter a dark horse each. \$75 will be distributed among the contestants.

There will also be a race between fishing boats of the Columbia River type. Seven entries have been received to date. A prize of \$25 will go to the winner of that event. Kendall is trying to get the Gorst & King hydroplane as an extra attraction, but that cannot be announced as a certainty at this time. All entries will close Thursday night. Those who have not entered should notify Kendall as soon as possible.
