She rescues girls from evil associates, breaks up joy rides where they include immature and unsophisticated girls, stands between the reckless girl and a wayward life, brings back to her parents many a wanderer and teaches the deceived and foolish girl many wholesome truths.

She searches the city for the discouraged, the deluded and the incurable, and gives each the proper treatment and advice. She takes from dance halls the girls who have no business to be there, and makes her go home.

In a writup of a ball game here in 1881, the Coos Bay News of June 29, 1881, had the following: The Marshfield baseball club chartered the steamer Juno last Sunday to take them up Coos River for the purpose of playing a game with the Coos River club.

The game was played near the forks, at Jap Yoakham's place. Three innings were played before dinner. After dinner the game was delayed by the absence of the center fielder of the "Star" nine, who had disappeared in an unaccountable manner.

After his return four more innings were played, which resulted in the following score: Marshfield, 23; Coos River, 12. There was a large company of ladies and gentlemen present witnessing the play, and the ladies will long be remembered for their liberality in furnishing an excellent lunch, sufficient for all in attendance.

NO TRACE OF FORGER FOUND

Jim Burnett's Crime Great Surprise to Dr. Hayes, Who Knew Him For Years

No trace has yet been found of Jim Burnett, a stationary engineer, who passed four bad checks on local firms Saturday. It is suspected that he left early Sunday morning for Portland.

Dr. Hayes, who knew him off and on in a casual way for the last seven years, since he first came to the Bay, visited with him late Saturday evening and Burnett told him he was going to Portland for the Fourth. Dr. Hayes says he is much surprised. Burnett had traveled extensively and was a free spender. He and his wife separated about three years ago. Friday he came to Marshfield and told Dr. Hayes he had been working at the Ten Mile sawmill. Dr. Hayes had not seen him for two years. He borrowed some money and Saturday returned and paid it back.

The checks were drawn on the First National Bank of North Bend and were signed by F. L. Botaford, of Portland, who has been buying ties and poles. Each check was for \$87.50 and they were cashed by A. J. Mendel, of the Hub Clothing Store. Fred Johnson, of the North Bend Saloon, a bartender in Mirraqui's Bohemian Saloon and the Union Saloon.

DYNAMITE IN FIRE FATAL

CHARLOTTE, N. C., July 2. Fire Chief Wallace and one fireman were killed and three others seriously injured by dynamite exploding in a small fire yesterday. The dynamite was ignited by fire in a barn.

HOW CITY MANAGERSHIP SUCCEEDS AT DAYTON

SINCE January 1, 1914, Dayton, Ohio, has been governed by a city manager. In these five months the advantage of centering power and responsibility in a single official has made itself obvious. Prompt, direct and decisive action has been introduced into the administration of municipal affairs.

For instance: The departments of fire, public works and water not seldom under preceding administrations had failed to cooperate in keeping the streets clean. City Manager Waite had been in charge only two days when he established the practice of flushing the streets periodically, and now they no longer become filthy and unhealthy.

The contracts for the disposal of garbage had expired, but the failure of the mayor and council in 1913 to work together at solving the problem of the removal of refuse had nullified effort for this purpose.

Mr. Waite at once had funds appropriated and put at his disposal for investigating the situation and secured competent engineers within a month to report practicable plans. He has already secured a new water supply and also measures that will eventually insure full provision for all needs of the city.

The systems of efficiency employed by big business are being adopted by the city manager for the public business of Dayton. The management of municipal finance avails itself of the newest methods of fiscal control. The 1914 budget is based on a clear financial program resting in data classified according to the character of the expenditures.

Unit-cost accounting for cleaning and for repairing streets for collection of ashes and rubbish and for removal of garbage is in course of installation.

No municipal employe receives remuneration without showing records of his time and work.

The purchasing division that has been established saves enough every month to pay its expenses for whole year.

Standardization for all goods chased by the city is going into effect. The public health activities doubled.

A bureau for free legal advice those unable to employ an attorney has been founded, and counseled clients the first month.

The morale of the police and firemen, which years of neglect had destroyed, has been renewed through the city manager taking personal charge of both.

Five months are too soon to judge of the final effectiveness and desirability of city managerhip, says an exchange. But it is evident that these and other fine achievements are due to the public spirit of the citizens and to their putting authority and accountability for all departments upon one official.

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
