MOTOR CAR TO RUN THROUGH

Will Start Service to Bunker Hill and Bay Park Tomorrow—Will Fix Road

Supt. Miller, of the Southern Pacific, announced today that the motor car would be started on the Bunker Hill and Bay Park run tomorrow. For the two days it will run every hour, going as far as the mill switch or mile post No. 1 near Bay Park. After the celebration, he plans to continue the motor car service out there, but how often it will run he has not determined. A five-cent fare will be charged between here and there.

Just how soon the car will be started on the run between here and Myrtle Point he has not determined. He has about two or three weeks' work on the ballasting of the line. Most of the gravel has been dumped along the road and is piled up so that the motor car coils would not clear it.

Supt. Miller has loaned his road crew to Engineer Wheeler to ballast the North Bend end of the new road and they will dash on this about next Tuesday.

Today three trains of gravel were brought in and a couple of these will be unloaded on the new track south of the old Alliance warehouse.

AID FOR EXPOSITION

ROSEBURG, Or., July 2.—The County Court has appropriated the donation of \$200 for the use of the Southern Oregon Pioneers Exposition Association. The association is composed of Klamath, Jackson and Douglas counties and will make a joint surplus for the fair next year. The \$200, which was previously appropriated for the Douglas County exposition, was used for the purpose.

FIRE DESTROYS BUCKET DREDGE

Damaged to Extent of About \$3000—Was Anchored Off Porter

The old bucket dredge, owned by the Simpson Lumber Company, was damaged to the extent of about \$3000 when it caught fire while anchored off Porter about 8 o'clock last night. The cause of the fire has not been ascertained.

The deck of the dredge and most of the machinery was destroyed by the fire, which burned fiercely for about an hour. The North Bend fire department was called, but owing to the difficulty experienced in reaching the dredge the fire had done much damage when it arrived.

The blaze attracted many to the waterfront at North Bend and the fire could be plainly seen from Marshfield. The local fire department was not called.

The bucket dredge has been working in the vicinity of Porter for some time. About ten men were employed to operate it.
