

PROHIBITION HITS SCOTLAND

NEW LAW PREVENTS SALOONS FROM OPENING UNTIL AFTER 10 O'CLOCK IN ORDER TO PROTECT WORKINGMEN.

LONDON, July 2.—The Scottish workingman has been deprived of his early morning drink, which is generally a "p and g"—a pint of water and a gill of whiskey.

It has been found that the habit of drinking before breakfast has a bad effect on the health of the workingman and a law has just come into force which prevents the saloons or clubs from opening before 10 o'clock in the morning. By this time the men have returned to work and the time for temptation passed.

While the regulation applies to the whole of Scotland, the mischief it is intended to strike at is localized in the industrial districts of Glasgow. There it is the custom for the workmen to start their day at 6 in the morning and continue until 5:30 in the evening, with a breakfast interval from 9 to 9:30, and a dinner hour from 1 to 2. With the saloons open from 8 o'clock there was a temptation for the men to take a refresher before breakfast, and this was not only unwholesome in itself but conducted to excessive drinking at other hours.

The men have not complained of the new law, but they have asked that if the saloons are not opened before breakfast hour they be opened before they return to work so they may at least have a drink after eating.

The saloonkeepers have been complaining that the best part of their trade will be ruined.

GRANTS PASS FISHING

Large Number of Salmon Caught in Rogue River Now

The Grants Pass Courier says: The run of salmon in the river shows some increase, and the fifteen boats of the fleet that were out Friday night brought in 2000 pounds of dressed fish. For a couple of weeks past the run had been light, running down to half of the Friday night catch. The price has also been very low, slumping to six cents per pound at one time. The low prices were quoted in the Portland markets, and with the slump the fishermen looked for a better market, sending the bulk of the catch into California, San Francisco and Stockton getting regular shipments. Saturday orders from Sacramento were received, and the price was strengthened to eight cents per pound. Twenty-five boats are included in the fleet, but all have not been fishing during the light run.
