TRADE OUTLOOK IS IMPROVED

Lumbermen at Portland Expect Revival of Business in Near Future

PORTLAND, Or., July 3.—That signs point toward improved market conditions in the lumber industry, after the general depression of the last eighteen months, was indicated by expressions yesterday on the part of northwest lumbermen at the regular monthly meeting of the West Coast Lumber Manufacturer's Association, at the Hotel Benson. The fact clearly was brought out that the stocks of retailers now are unusually low and that most all northwest mills have been shipping at least up to their cut. Inquiries for orders are more free than for some time past. It is predicted too that the nation's banner crop condition will tend toward a slight car shortage. These conditions, lumbermen declare, indicate that prices will ascend slightly from their present bed-rock level by fall. How great this increase will be none present cared to predict, but it probably will not be large at the outset. The delegates yesterday declared that prices will have to increase considerably before they can again receive any return on their full investments.

E. W. Demarest, of Tacoma, reported at the meeting yesterday that the Southern Pacific has a requisition for about 5000 cars as another source of encouragement to the lumber industry.

STRANGE CASE UP IN COURT

J. H. Grindrod and J. Burcham, Formerly of Ferndale, Arrested Today

T. H. Grindrod of Ferndale, by paying \$8.50 cash and putting up a \$15 order on Mr. Russell, a Coos River rancher, this morning was released on the charge of attempting to defraud R. A. Copple out of a \$29 bill.

J. Burcham, who came here from Bandon, is a close friend of Grindrod, and is still in jail on a similar charge, but Burcham refuses to attempt to settle, claiming that his wife and not himself was involved, if anyone was. Burcham has some money, having recently sold a boathouse for \$75, and had a steady job at good wages.

Grindrod was arrested a few days ago on the charge of taking an engine from W. S. Chandler's boat and was also suspected of having been mixed up in the Empire road auto robbery. Both he and Burcham were held but no evidence was obtained against them and they were released. They had gathered their goods together and were shipping them to Portland when Constable Cox attached them.

According to Mr. Copple's charges, Grindrod appeared at the Golden Rule some days ago with Mrs. Burcham and introduced her as his wife. He asked for credit for a bill of goods and gave the name of his mother-in-law, a respected woman living in Ferndale, as reference. Mr. Copple investigated and found the woman mentioned to be all right and let Mrs. Burcham, whom he supposed to be Mrs. Grindrod, have \$29 worth of goods. Later he found that he had been imposed upon.

Grindrod has a wife and child, but his wife says he is infatuated with Mrs. Burcham and they have separated. Grindrod was planning to leave with Mr. and Mrs. Burcham for Portland when this matter came up. Burcham was going to have an attorney come from North Bend this afternoon and try and gain his release. Justice Pennock says that Burcham will first have to pay about \$20, the balance on the bill and the costs of the prosecution, before he will get out. If he doesn't do it today, he may have to remain in jail a week as Justice Pennock will leave Sunday.
