Salvation Army's Growth
 JULY 2, 1914.
 THEN AND NOW.
 Forty-nine years ago today, the world's first meeting of the Salvation Army was held. It took place in an old patched tent erected in an ancient burial ground in the Whitechapel district of London. The first preacher was William Booth, a clergyman who was at that time without a church. He had been called upon to take the place of the regular minister, who was lying ill at his home. The first congregation was made up of a "mass of poor people, many of them evidently without God, or hope in the world." After the meeting Booth hurried to his home and exclaimed to his wife: "Kate, I have found my destiny! As I passed by the doors of the flaming gin-palaces tonight, I seemed to hear a voice sounding in my ears: 'Where can you find such heathens as these and where is there so great need for your labors?' And there and then in my soul I offered myself and you and our children up to this great work." This was the beginning of a world-wide organization. From that day meetings were held regularly. On the third Sunday the tent blew down and was wrecked beyond repair. Having no money for another and without funds to rent a building, Booth preached in the open air. Finally he secured the use of an old dance hall that was not in use on Sundays. Week-day meetings were held in a dilapidated shed, formerly a storehouse for old rags. As the army grew it was forced into the streets; narrow alleys, abandoned saloons, or unoccupied theaters became Salvation Army chapels.
 Today the Salvation Army is the greatest evangelistic organization in the world. The poke-bonneted Army lassie is a familiar sight in every country on earth with the one exception of Russia. They are "waging God's battle" even in Ireland. They have laid siege to Russia and it is reported that even that empire is on the point of capitulation. Their battle cry is heard in every commonwealth of the United States; more than 900 "outposts," or missions, are located in nearly every city and town. In these meeting places more than ten million Americans gather during a year's time (to listen to the exhortations of nearly 7000 officers, of both sexes, that make up the Salvation Army in the United States. The street corner meeting is a familiar sight in every part of the world. More than 150,000 of these are held every year in this country, at which over 50,000 recruits have been gathered in a twelvemonth to the Army's ranks from the congregations. "Our war is a war of mercy," they proclaim and it is witnessed by the world-wide charity of the organization. It has established in the United States nearly 100 workingmen's hotels which accommodate annually more than 2,000,000 persons; over 120 industrial homes, where about 3,000,000 meals have been served in a year; about 30 Rescue and Maternity Homes where 6000 girls and children find shelter.

Normal School Development
 JULY 3, 1914.
 THEN AND NOW.
 Seventy-five years ago today the first state normal school in the United States was opened in Lexington, Mass. The parlor of a boarding house was the cradle of this educational system. In those days it was thought a school "to teach teachers how to teach" was a needless expenditure of time and money. Unable to secure state aid, the pioneers accepted money offered by Edmund Dwight, who later became conspicuously identified with the new educational movement. The first class, consisting of five girls, had the Rev. Cyrus Peirce of Nantucket as its teacher. At the end of the first year, the school, known as the Lexington Academy, had twenty-five students—all girls. It had demonstrated its worth so thoroughly that the legislature voted by a large majority to appropriate sufficient funds to establish it as a permanent adjunct to the educational system.
 Today the normal school is an indispensable part of the public school system throughout the United States. It exerts a commanding influence over the 523,000 school teachers who instruct 18,000,000 school children. The old-time pedagogue, who was considered efficient if he or she had mastered the three R's, is giving way to the highly trained normal school graduate who has spent two or more years in diligent study to prepare for the profession. There are more than 300 public and private normal schools in the United States today. The number of prospective teachers enrolled as students aggregates nearly 100,000, of which three-fourths are women. The graduates from the higher teachers' institutions are masters of curriculums equal to those of the most advanced universities—several of these institutions grant pedagogical degrees. The normal school exists today in practically every civilized country.

BOY'S HARD LUCK
 Fined for Hunting After Being Denied License
 SALEM, Or., July 3.—To be denied his hunting license because he was a foreigner and to be denied an application for naturalization papers because he was under 21 and then to be denied an application for a permit to carry a gun by the Sheriff because he was only 17, was the fate today of a young Greek who resides near Silverton. It is a felony for a foreigner to even apply for a hunting license, but the young man was referred to the Sheriff's office, where, by paying \$25 he might secure a permit to carry a gun under which circumstances the County Clerk would be obliged to grant a hunting license. The Sheriff investigated the case and refused to issue a permit to carry the gun on account of the youth of the applicant.

COST OF ELECTIONS
 Marion County Gets Off Easter This Year.
 SALEM, Or., July 3.—The expense of holding the recent primary election was 12 cents less per vote than the expense of two years ago and the reduction in cost was largely due to the greater efficiency of the election boards, according to the opinion of County Clerk Gehlar. The judges and clerks are paid according to the time required to hold the election and to count the votes and where the work is carried out with speed the cost is less per vote. It cost \$6,110.91 to hold the last election, and 92,662 votes were cast at a cost of 66 cents each. In 1912 it cost \$4,158.82 to take care of 5,368 votes, or a cost of 78 cents each. At this election also there were more judges and clerks in proportion to the number of votes cast than 1912.
