OVER 2000 SEE BIG RACE MEET

Over 2000 people attended the big race and field meet held at Myrtle Point on July 3 and 4. The gate receipts amounted to over \$1000.

In the first race held on Friday there were three entries. Coos Bay, owned by P. P. Norton; Cora Bell, owned by Percy Ward and Miss Miller, owned by E. P. Miller.

In the second race, three-eighths of a mile, Sir Ashton finished first; Mary D., second; Teddy, third; Shamrock, fourth; Joe Green, fifth.

In the third race, five-eighths of a mile, Steel finished first; Charles Foster, second; Lucky Strike, third.

In the fourth race, free for all, pace or trot, over half-mile course in two heats, Halmont finished first; Wahke, second, and Jim, third.

In the fifth and last, a novelty race on the third, over a mile course Greenlaw finished first; Gift second; Rogue River, third; Abeela fourth.

In the second race, a half mile trot or pace, free for all, run in three heats, Halmont finished first, Jim B., second, and Wahke, third.

In the last race, called the merchants' derby, over a mile course, Gift finished first; Greenlaw, second; Volaki, third.

Gift is owned by C. Goodpasture, Rogue River by Jack Yoakum; Greenlaw by Joe Knight, of Myrtle Point; Halmont, by Sam Yoder, of Medford; Charles Foster, by Marshal Nay.

There were many other features in the Fourth of July celebration at Myrtle Point, including a parade, fireworks, field and water sports and other events.
