SCHOFIELD NEWS

SCHOFIELD, Or., July 6.—Ernest Creswell, chief cook at the big tunnel camp since the first of the year, has taken over the management of the dining department of the Lakeside Hotel, and with his wife and son, has left via Gardiner for Coos Bay for his new position. Arthur Creswell, a brother, now presides over the culinary department at Siding No. 25.

To what an extent the railroad will be appreciated here is shown by the fact that Mr. Creswell and family, with only a trunk and camping outfit had to travel some forty miles to get over the hill to Lakeside, a distance of five miles. Even the through mail from the towns along the Umpqua and from Western Lane County must be packed on horses, over a narrow trail. For all but taxing purposes the lower Umpqua will be annexed to Coos County by the completion of the railroad.

COOS WAREHOUSE PLAN

Farmers' Union Will Have Places in Three Towns.

At the Woodman Hall here, the stockholders of the new Farmers' Union Warehouse Company, of Coos County, met and adopted a constitution and by-laws and elected a board of five directors as follows: O. A. Mintonye, of Coquille; R. L. Weekly and W. Lee Ray, of Myrtle Point; N. O. Watson, of Coos City, and George F. Smith, of Marshfield.

In the afternoon the directors met and organized by electing O. A. Mintonye president; N. O. Watson, vice-president; R. L. Weekly, secretary and George F. Smith, treasurer. The capital stock of the company is \$3000, and it is already the owner of warehouses at Coquille, Myrtle Point and Marshfield. The company will do a general warehouse business, not only for the members of the Farmers' Union, but also for the public generally.—Coquille Sentinel.
