THE NEW DANCES.

THE staid Springfield Republican has got down to discussing the new dances in earnest, and hundreds of people, generally regarded as respectable are spending more time dancing than they ever spent before in dancing in their lives. PACIFIC COAST

Capt. Macgenn Reports Coos Bay Entrance Deepening—Other Port Soundings

Coos Bay bar has twenty feet of water in the main channel now, according to soundings made by Captain T. J. Macgenn of the steamer Breakwater for the U. S. Hydrographic office. The results of these soundings, with the soundings made on other bars south of Astoria are included in the July report of the hydrographic office.

The hydrographic report for July is as follows:

SEVENTY-SIX
WOMEN TO AID

Many Applicants for Mothers' Pension in Coos County—Two New Ones

COQUILLE, Or., July 8.—Since the new Oregon mothers' pension law went into effect, seventy-six have applied to the Coos county court for it under its terms. A number of these have been rejected, but about fifty are on the list now.

Yesterday Judge Hall granted Mrs. Kate Freeland of North Bend, whose husband was killed in the recent sawmill explosion at Ten Mile, \$32.50 per month. He also granted Mrs. Venice Gill of Coquille \$26.25 per month.

The applications of Mrs. Mabel L. Roberts and Mrs. Jas. Ferrari were not acted upon. Another application was also made but the name was not given out.

A Bandon woman, whose name was not made public, made application for a pension but as she was childless the court refused to grant her any pension.

MOVE LOGGING CAMPS.

Claim Moore Company Will Cut Bountin Timber.

G. T. Treadgold, attorney for Geo. W. Moore Lumber Co., states that the Moore Lumber Company will shortly abandon Lampa Creek tract of the Coach Timber Co., and will move their logging operations into another and more desirable piece of timber on the north side of the river. The tract referred to is the Bountin tract, being a part of the original Chadwick tract, containing some of the finest timber in the county.

HOTEL AT BANDON.

Propose to Raise \$100,000 for the "New Gallier."
J. C. Hammel, formerly of the Albany Hotel at Albany, Oregon, is in the city with his architect, J. S. Atkins, with plans and specifications for a new three-story hotel for Bandon, the building to be of reinforced concrete with pressed brick front.

The hotel is to be named the "New Hotel Gallier," and will be located between the present hotel and the U. S. life-saving station. The building will be 100 x 100, three stories high, and will have 52 bed rooms most of which will be equipped with bath and all conveniences. There will be a popular priced dining room, a grill room, hotel parlor, ball room, and in fact, everything that goes with a modern hotel.

A meeting of citizens was held Wednesday night and a committee of five, composed of Geo. W. Moore, J. L. Kronenburg, Geo. P. Laird, Dr. E. P. Sorenson and F. J. Fahy, was appointed to sell stock.

Articles of incorporation are being drawn and the capital stock will probably be placed at \$100,000, with shares at \$100 each par value.—Bandon Recorder.

PANAMA RAILWAY DEAL.

The transportation division of the Panama Railroad has been placed in charge of F. R. Blount, former trainmaster, as superintendent.
