## All Over Oregon

SALEM—Postal receipts for the months of April, May and June at the Salem Postoffice exceeded by \$4,582.55 the receipts for the same period last year. The receipts taken in during the three months this year amounted to \$20,788.04.

EUGENE—Lane County hop growers are smiling as the temperature increases. Every hot day is tending to give Lane County one of the best crops in years. One grower states that he expects to harvest 2,500 pounds an acre, and sees little opportunity for losing the crop.

EUGENE—From 500,000 feet to 2,500,000 feet of logs are to be delivered monthly to the new Booth-Kelly mill at Springfield from the logging camp of Wilbur Hyland, about four miles above Lowell.

EUGENE—Motion pictures of Eugene were taken as it celebrated the Fourth of July, by a Pathe Weekly representative. The pictures will be shown at the Panama-Pacific Exposition.

KLAMATH FALLS—Alleging that Eugene Spencer has uttered "false, scandalous, slanderous and defamatory remarks" about him, and has attempted to ruin his reputation and good business name, John Connolly has filed in the Circuit Court a suit for \$10,000 damages against Spencer.

MEDFORD—The Medford Creamery has been sold by Mrs. W. A. Chappell to A. A. Moody, of Ashland, who took charge July 1. Mr. Chappell, lately deceased, made a fine trade and a worthy reputation during his brief ownership.

MEDFORD—Yesterday was a busy day in Medford according to the traffic statistics being gathered by the watchman at the Southern Pacific crossing. 2169 people passed the tracks and only one in every twelve looked to see if a train was coming.

ROSEBURG—L. L. Spencer, who resides on a ranch about two miles south of Roseburg was quite seriously injured when he was caught beneath a heavy door of his barn.

ROSEBURG—The election to authorize bonds in the sum of \$300,000, with which to aid in the construction of a railroad from Roseburg to tidewater, will be held at the time of the regular election in October, according to the Roseburg railroad committee.

## WILL DEVELOP NEW BUSINESS

### J. L. Bowman Adds New Department to His New Clothing Factory

J. L. Bowman, proprietor of the Woolen Mill Store, who arrived here yesterday from Portland for a ten days' stay on the Bay, announces that in connection with the clothing factory which he recently started at Portland he has installed a tailoring department which will compete with the eastern made-to-measure houses. The new branch starts this month and he will endeavor to cover eight states with it. He secured most of his help direct from the large eastern tailoring houses and feels confident that it will prove a big success. He says that millions of dollars go from western states every year to the eastern made-to-order tailoring houses and he thinks that this money can be kept on the coast. In addition to the made-to-measure department, the clothing factory will make suits for the large chain of stores which he conducts. He expects to have several hundred employees in his Portland clothing factory this fall and with the made-to-measure department going will keep them busy all the time. He anticipates an improvement in business conditions. He says that Marshfield appears to be the most prosperous place that he has visited in many weeks.
