LORDEN TELLS OF BEACH TRIP

SAYS BEACH ROUTE IS FINE FOR MOTORCYCLES—DIFFER AS TO BEST ROUTES OUT TO THE RAILWAY

The following letter was written by Clarence Lorden, who, with Chester Riggs, recently started on a motorcycle trip from Coos Bay.
GARDINER, Or., July 9.—Roads are older than Rome. Of all nations of profane antiquity, the Greeks are considered the real pioneers in road building. They realized the important part that roads play in the pioneering, development and life of a community.

The people of the United States today are divided on many questions and problems, but one essential factor upon which they all agree is "Good Roads." The residents of Coos Bay are all anxious for the commencement of a hard surface roadway to connect with the Lincoln highway. When this road is completed we shall see Coos Bay and the adjacent country as a visiting point for hundreds of motorists during the summer months.

"Which is the best way to go from Coos Bay to Portland?" I asked before starting on a motorcycle trip.

"Take the Alert at 5:45 in the morning and go by way of Drain," said Gordon Smith.

"The best way out of this country is by way of Myrtle Point and Roseburg," said John L. Koontz.

I then met Vernon Gorst. Mr. Gorst said that he considered the Scottsburg-Drain road the best. Believing that no matter which route I took we would wish we had proceeded otherwise, I boarded the launch Gasso at 5:00 a. m., the following day and reaching Jarvis Landing dexterously manipulating the handlebars on the motorcycle until we reached the beach by staying close to the center of a 24-inch plank.

Reaching the beach we saw the autos speeding toward the Umpqua River, a distance of twenty miles. We motored close to the Ford's until we reached Ten Mile Creek, where the autos were towed across by a double team. The operation takes only a few moments and the autos are again on their way, returning in thirty minutes from the mouth of the Umpqua River with a body of passengers coming to Coos Bay.

For thirty years Mr. Cornwall had operated a horse drawn stage over the beach route, until recently when Messrs. Gorst and King have placed automobiles on the run making the trip in thirty minutes to the delight of all who make the trip, as against four hours by horse drawn stage, and the dissatisfaction of many passengers.

Nature's roadway from Coos Bay to Gardiner is the finest roadway and the least expensive in Coos County.
