## PIONEER DIED HERE SUNDAY

Fred Timmerman Succumbs to Complication of Ills—Son Makes Fast Trip Here.

Frederick Timmerman, a well known pioneer of Coos Bay, died at his home here yesterday after a few weeks illness of a complication of diseases. News of his death came as a shock to his many friends as he was reported improving the latter part of the week.

His only surviving son and relative in this section, Max Timmerman, arrived this morning from Brookings, having made the 114 miles to Coos Bay in less than twenty-four hours. He did it by driving an auto all last night.

Mr. Timmerman was born in North Germany in 1840 and came to Coos Bay in 1874. Three children and his wife preceded him in death. Mrs. Timmerman dying in 1904. Miss Wanda Stevens, a well known Marshfield young woman, made her home with the Timmerman family for years.

The funeral will be held Wednesday afternoon at 2 o'clock from the Wilson chapel, Rev. R. E. Browning officiating. Mr. Timmerman was a member of Sunset Lodge No. 51, I. O. O. F.
