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## HUERTA WILL OFFICIALLY RESIGN PRESIDENCY THIS AFTERNOON

Francisco Carbajal Will Take Oath of Office After President's Resignation.

OFFICIALS LEFT MEXICO CITY THIS MORNING

Thought Dictator and Family Will Leave From Puerto Mexico Tomorrow.

MEXICO CITY, July 15.—Official announcement is made that, actuated "by highest motives and patriotism," President Huerta will send his resignation to Congress at 4 o'clock this afternoon. Francisco Carbajal will take the oath of office as provisional president two hours later.

OFFICIALS LEFT MEXICO CITY, July 15.—General Huerta was about the principal streets of the capital this morning and at 11 o'clock as usual went to a barber shop in front of the cable office to be shaved.

### OFFICIALS LEAVE

VERA CRUZ, July 15.—Two special trains, containing the families of Huerta and General Blanquet and others from Mexico City en route from Mexico City to the coast, are reported to have arrived at Orizaba this morning. From that point it is believed they may proceed to Puerto Mexico, where they should arrive tomorrow morning. It is believed that Huerta and his friends intend to board the Dutch warship Kortenaar, which left here today for Puerto Mexico, as the Captain went to Mexico City after his arrival here and the cruiser sailed without him.

## FEDERALS AND REBELS FIGHTING

Constitutionalists Suffer Heavy Loss at Palomas—Was Important Port.

EL PASO, July 15.—Reports of fighting at Palomas, opposite Columbus, New Mexico, between Constitutionalists and Federal filibusters under Roque Gomez were received here today. The reports conflicted as to whether the Constitutionalists of the guerrillas had been victorious. The Columbus-Palomas port is the entry for cattle from Chihuahua. Later it was learned that 48 members of the Constitutionalist garrison were either killed in battle or executed by the Federal filibusters.

## SEATTLE IN GALA ATTIRE

Potlatch Opens With International Power-Boat Race—Yacht Race Tomorrow.

SEATTLE, July 15.—The Potlatch, the annual summer festival, opened here at noon today and will continue until Saturday night. The international power boat race between Vancouver and Seattle will terminate here this afternoon. The Lipton cup yacht races will be in tomorrow.

## VILLA ARRIVED AT JUAREZ TODAY

Will Make Plans of Southern Campaign, Which Will Commence in a Few Days.

EL PASO, July 15.—General Villa, with his staff and a small escort, arrived today at Juarez to spend a few days. Villa is expected to return south and have the entire army moving toward Mexico City within eight days. Villa's troops are spread over southern Chihuahua. While at Juarez he will arrange for future supplies. While it is known that his supply of artillery is ample, he is short of rifle cartridges.

## FEDERALS BEGIN TO LEAVE CITY

Evacuating Guaymas Today—Embarking Horses and Cattle on Str. Benito Juarez.

ON BOARD U. S. S. CALIFORNIA, Mazatlan, July 15 (By Wireless).—The evacuation of Guaymas by the Federals was begun yesterday with the arrival of the steamer Benito Juarez, according to reports to Admiral Howard. The first step preliminary to a general exodus began with the embarking of horses and cattle.

### AMMUNITION LANDED.

TAMPICO, July 15.—The schooner Sunshine, from Galveston, without opposition from naval authorities, landed two million cartridges for the constitutionalists.

## BOXING EXPERTS IN SAME MIND

Remarkably Even Division of Opinion as to Chances of Smith and Carpenter.

LONDON, July 15.—Boxing experts here show a remarkably even division of opinion as to the chances of "Gunboat" Smith, the American heavyweight, and Georges Carpentier, the French heavyweight champion, in a 20-round match to be fought here tomorrow. The betting odds are a shade in favor of the Frenchman, but this probably is due to the enthusiasm of his countrymen, great numbers of whom crossed the channel to see the fight. The officers and crew of the American battleship Missouri will be present to cheer up the former blue jacket.

## SEVEN MINERS KILLED IN MINE DISASTER

IRON RIVER, Mich., July 15.—Seven miners were killed in the Balkan Mine at Alpha location, near here, when sliding sand caused a cave-in.

## CZAR'S CONFIDANT ACCUSED OF RUINING LIVES OF YOUNG GIRLS

Says He Will Live and Punish His Enemies—An Assassin Once Before Tried to Reach and Kill Monk.

ST. PETERSBURG, July 15.—The emperor's court physician and the empress' lady in waiting left today for Tyumen, Siberia, to attend the mystic lay Monk and imperial confidant, Gregory Rasputin, who is suffering from a severe wound inflicted by a woman who tried to kill him. Guzva, the would-be assassin, said she tried to kill Rasputin because "he had shaken Christianity and without conscience had ruined the lives of young girls."

## VICTORY FOR JONE PROBABLE

Influential Administration Senators Try to Force Endorsement of President's Choice.

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 15.—After a night of constant effort to line up the administration Senators for President Wilson's nomination of Thomas D. Jone, of Chicago, for the Federal Reserve Board, it was reported at the White House today that a vote will probably not be reached before Friday and the result, with a victory for the President, would be very close.

## YOUNG MAN DISAPPEARS

Ralph Culver Has Not Been Heard From Since Monday Evening.

Declaring that he had nothing to live for and that luck was against him, Ralph Culver, age 23, left his room at 236 Market street about 7 o'clock last Monday morning and has not been heard from since. Relatives and friends of the young man fear that he has ended his life or met with foul play.

Mrs. E. M. Johnson, who conducts the boarding house where Culver had a room, says that he told her early last Monday morning that he was going to the employment office in search of work. Bert Doremus, who conducts the office, says that Culver called there Monday morning but that he had nothing to offer him in his line and that he has not seen him since.

Mrs. Johnson says that Culver was despondent and often told her, when he was out of work, that he had nothing to live for. Culver has been employed in a number of restaurants and hotels about the city, in the capacity of a dishwasher or waiter. He worked at the Chandler for some time, quitting his job there on May 18. Since that time he has had only temporary employment.

Mrs. Fred Mesler, a cousin of Culver, came here yesterday from Newport to institute a search for him, but she found no trace of the "missing" boy. Both Mrs. Mesler and Mrs. Johnson went to the places where he had been employed and made inquiry among some of his friends. Culver came to this city from Newport about a year ago.

It is understood that he has a number of relatives living in Marshfield or North Bend, but their names could not be learned. Anyone knowing the whereabouts of the young man is requested to notify Mrs. Johnson, 236 Market street.

Culver took none of his personal effects when he left the boarding house. Mrs. Johnson will hold them until called for.

## MISS EVA RINEHARDT ARRESTED AT SAN JOSE WHILE ENROUTE TO SAN FRANCISCO.

INSURANCE COMPANIES HAD BODIES EXHUMED

Three Policies, Aggregating \$15,500, Taken Out Shortly Before Death.

SAN JOSE, Cal., July 15.—Miss Eva J. Rinehardt, aged 27, accused of having caused the death by poison of Mrs. Katherine Bluet in an Auburn, Placer county hospital, was arrested here today. It is understood that she was en route to San Francisco in an auto.

The two women conducted a hospital at Auburn. Last January while disinfecting clothes, Mrs. Bluet suffered burns and died. Shortly before she had taken out three life insurance policies aggregating \$15,500. Her will named Miss Rinehardt as sole heir and executrix.

Two insurance companies recently had the body exhumed and two physicians said that the burns were not sufficient to cause death. The brain and viscera were sent to San Francisco to be examined for the suspected presence of poison.

## BLACK SMOKE FROM CRATER

Mount Lassen Active Again, But Less Ashes Fall During the Outbreak.

REDDING, Cal., July 15.—Black smoke believed to be a mile high was seen coming from the crater of Lassen Peak this morning. The amount of falling ashes is small compared with previous eruptions, although the duration of the disturbance is longer. The violence of the outbreak began to dwindle after two hours, although the mountain still emitted smoke.

## HALIBUT TRUST IN LIMELIGHT

SEATTLE, July 15.—The Federal grand jury returned indictments under the Sherman anti-trust law against members of the so-called halibut trust, which controls most of the halibut caught in the North Atlantic and North Pacific and Bering Sea waters and sold in the United States. The indictments allege a conspiracy to control and limit the supply and price of halibut.

The indictments were returned against the Booth Fisheries Company of Washington and Maryland, Chilpeck Fish Company of Seattle, International Fisheries Company, San Juan Fishing and Packing Company, Occidental Fish Company, and individual members of the companies. The indictments charge the companies controlled the markets of Seattle, Tacoma, Vancouver, Prince Rupert and Boston. The complaint was made by independent fishermen of Seattle.

## ASSISTANT TREASURER OF UNITED STATES MARRIED
