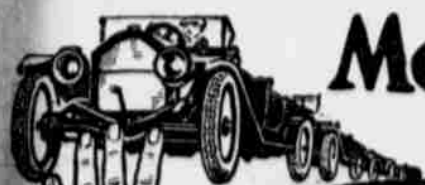

**For Races.**—F. P. Norton is endeavoring to arrange a race meet to be held here August 4 in connection with the Moose Day festivities. He is not certain yet whether there will be enough good horses here for a good card.

**Parisian Dye Works Sold.**—The Parisian Dye Works, located at the corner of Second and Market streets, was sold yesterday by W. B. Terry to Mrs. A. I. Thornburg. The establishment will continue under the same name and Mrs. Thornburg intends to build up a good business.

**Improve Inlets.**—The Port of Coos Bay has awarded the Larson Dredging Company the contract for dredging Kentuck Inlet as petitioned by A. G. Raab and others. The Port is also figuring on doing some dredging in Isthmus Inlet, where there is fifteen feet or more of water up to Maxwell with the exception of one or two small shoals.

**Shark Caught.**—A shark measuring over six feet was caught far out over the bar yesterday by James Wasson and is now on display at his

fishmarket on the waterfront. Wasson caught the shark for Dan Dillinger, who plans to make a cane from the backbone of the big fish. Wasson says that he caught a shark twice as large as the one on display but that it got away from him.
