Builds Landing.—J. Albert Matson is constructing a new landing at his summer home on South Coos River. He plans to fasten it to the ledge of rock. Heretofore the freshets have been carrying away his landings each spring.

Property Escaped.—E. A. May has received word that some of his valuable property at Condon, Or., had a narrow escape in the recent fire there. The Congregational church and an adjoining house were burned, but Mr. May's property was only damaged to the extent of about \$25.

Removes Stumps.—E. L. Bessey, who was in from South Coos River today, stated that he has just completed clearing six acres of fine bench land on his place. On the six acres he had to remove 375 stumps, some of them being big ones that took a dozen sticks of explosives to split.

FIND IRON ORE NOT FAR AWAY
DAIRYMEN TO HAVE PICNICS

Andy Greer and Albert Collins Report Discovery and Show Samples.
 While exploring some acreage in a nearby county recently, Albert Collins, a prospector, and Andy Greer, of Wedderburn, Australia, discovered iron ore deposits, which, according to the prospectors, is rich in quality and plentiful in quantity. The two men went to the property at the instance of L. J. Justen, proprietor of the St. Lawrence Hotel.

Justen says that they have eight claims staked out and that he and Greer are willing to invite promoters in on the proposition. He says that individuals will not be allowed to take more than 20 acres. By developing the property himself the individual will get 25 per cent when sold, or he can buy a claim, allow others to develop it, and then realize 25 per cent.

Greer and Collins have returned to the city with samples of the ore, which they got ten feet below the surface. Greer has sent thirty-two pounds of the ore to Duluth, where it will be examined by experts.
