EMMA GOLDMAN HERE YESTERDAY

(Continued from Page One.)

Emma Goldman and Dr. Reitman were aboard, and when they came down the gangplank to walk about the streets of the city for a few minutes, everybody tried to get a glimpse of the couple.

"Men and women who are not ready to listen to contrary opinion on any given subject, thereby condemn themselves to the grossest ignorance and the most outrageous tyranny," said Emma Goldman, when interviewed. "If what the I. W. W. or any other undesirable, have to say is wrong, it will die of itself a much quicker death than if these people are beaten, clubbed, tarred, and driven out like wild beasts.

"Nor can anything I stand for be killed by mob-butcherly or by police violence. The issue of free speech is one of the most vital and fundamental in America, and the very moment any given section of the country undertakes to suppress freedom of expression, it at the same time undermines every other principle of liberty and condemns itself to death."

"After six years of active anarchist propaganda, I am beginning to understand that which is difficult for every American to appreciate; namely, that there is only as much freedom in America as the authorities and property interests are willing to grant," said Dr. Reitman, "and it is very plain to me now that whenever the police permit too much free speech, the capitalist class will step in and take matters into its own hands.

"Our San Diego experience of May 12, 1912, not only burned industrial unionism into my flesh, but also engraved on my heart and soul that this is a country of the master class, and that the latter controls free speech."

"Many lessons can be drawn from our San Diego experience," added Miss Goldman, "but none more important than this: the business men and the property owners will fight for their rights. The historian who analyzes the cause of the San Diego trouble will have to record that it was property, and the fear that it may be taken from them, that roused the savagery of the San Diego vigilantes."

Emma Goldman and Dr. Reitman were at Eureka from last Saturday until Wednesday noon, when they sailed on the Elder. While there they delivered a series of lectures and also at Arcata. They say that all of the meetings were well attended.

According to them, the trip up the coast from Eureka was very rough. They say the boat encountered a strong northwest wind and that she rolled considerably.

PHEASANT FLIES AGAINST AUTO.

Perhaps one of the most peculiar accidents that has happened for some time occurred last week when a Chinese pheasant flew full tilt into the hood of Steve Curren's auto. Mr. Curren was returning to Bandon with a load of passengers and was on the road between here and Coquille when they were surprised to hear something hit the auto top with considerable force. The car was stopped and an investigation disclosed the dead body of the pheasant.—Bandon World.

COOS BAY LINE SURVEY.

Will Let Contracts on Part of Sutherland Line Soon.

Sutherland, Or., July 17.—Another large party of surveyors arrived for work on the Sutherland, Coos Bay & Eastern Railroad. There are now about 25 surveyors on the work, a majority of whom are running lines through the timber belt in the east end of the valley. Superintendent Fox is expected to arrive here soon and it is announced that contracts will be let within a few days after his arrival for constructing the road. Two railroad contractors from Washington are now here to bid on the grading. From a reliable source it is learned that work on the survey west to the coast will start about the last of the present month.
