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HARRY KIMBALL MAKES REPORT

Total Receipts \$3503.21; Total Disbursements \$3127.02 —Balance of \$451.19.

Harry Kimball, Jr., general manager of the Fourth of July celebration, submitted a detailed report of the receipts and disbursements bearing on that event at a meeting of the Marshfield Chamber of Commerce last night. His report shows that the total receipts were \$3503.21 and that the total disbursements were \$3127.02, leaving a cash balance on hand amounting to \$376.19. Kimball stated that all who agreed to contribute to the general fund have come through with the exception of the Southern Pacific Company, and that he had been assured that that company had a check on the way now. The donation from the Southern Pacific amounted to \$25. The Moose Lodge has agreed to pay \$50 for the use of the dancing pavilion on Moose Day, and when both amounts have been collected there will be on hand a cash balance of \$451.19.

Following the reading of the report by Kimball, the Chamber of Commerce extended a vote of thanks to Kimball for the businesslike manner in which he conducted the financial end of the celebration, as well as being instrumental in making the 1914 Fourth of July celebration the greatest in the history of Marshfield.

The Chamber also decided to extend a vote of thanks to the ladies who took an active part in making the restroom one of the most conspicuous features of the two-day event.

So well pleased were the members of the Chamber with the work done by Kimball that his services were demanded for the next Fourth of July celebration.
