STIFF TEAM OF ROSEBURG ELKS

MANAGER TOM JAMES OF THE MARSHFIELD ELKS AND MANAGER BARGAR OF UMPIQUA AGGREGATION TELL OF MERITS.

The Roseburg News says: While the date for the ball game between the Roseburg and Marshfield Elks has not yet been definitely set, nevertheless the interest is at a white heat and many are the threats and predictions of what will happen on that day when it is finally played. Grand Master of the Correspondence Clark L. Bargar is in receipt of a letter from the same officer at Marshfield which tells of what is going to happen to the local Elks. Thomas B. James, the genial secretary of the Marshfield all-star team and order, writes Grand Master Bargar as follows: "I trust that my delay in replying to your letter has not inconvenienced your committee, as we are mighty anxious to show you up. We have an aggregation of all-stars, and if necessary can loan you one or two in order to make the game interesting. We have so much good material that our second team can wallop our first team occasionally. I would suggest that you start morning and evening practice, place your fence in your park back about fifty feet and have your players take out accident insurance, as we are a bunch of bold bad men, and baseball is our middle name." In this happy strain does the Marshfield manager write, yet Ross Goodman says that there can't be too much enthusiasm in Marshfield to suit him. Ross is the manager of the Roseburg team and he has not been losing any sleep over how the game will end. In conversation with a News representative, Ross said: "The Roseburg team will be composed of men who started the game of baseball. Why, one of our players put the base in ball, another put the ground in grounder and still another one put the out in fielder. All of our players are fireside companions and sure know how to hug the home plate. Talk about ball players, the Roseburg Elks had one of their players attend the International Baseball Conference at Cottage Grove and demonstrate the spit-ball throw. Of course, we will do a little practice work the morning of the game, but that will be as far as we care to carry the matter. Our middle name is not 'baseball'—that's our whole name and we are going to prove it." The game will probably be played the latter part of next month.


