**Brother Dead.**—Sol Driscoll of the Hub Clothing & Shoe Company received a telegram this morning announcing the sudden death of a brother in Spokane. No particulars were given.

**Are Engaged.**—Alva Granby, of Marshfield, who is now employed at the A. O. Rogers ranch on South Coos River, has written his family here announcing his engagement to Miss Clara Sargent of Coos River.

**Dr. Bartle Better.**—In a card to friends, Mrs. Ira B. Bartle states that Dr. Bartle was quite ill for a time, being threatened with typhoid fever. They were start for home in their auto last week and will probably reach North Bend early this week.

**Made Fast Run.**—Capt. Edgar Simpson left here late Saturday afternoon in his auto on a hurry up call to Roseburg. He planned to make the drive in less than six hours via the Myrtle Point road and clipped off the first eighteen miles out of Marshfield in about thirty minutes, it is said.

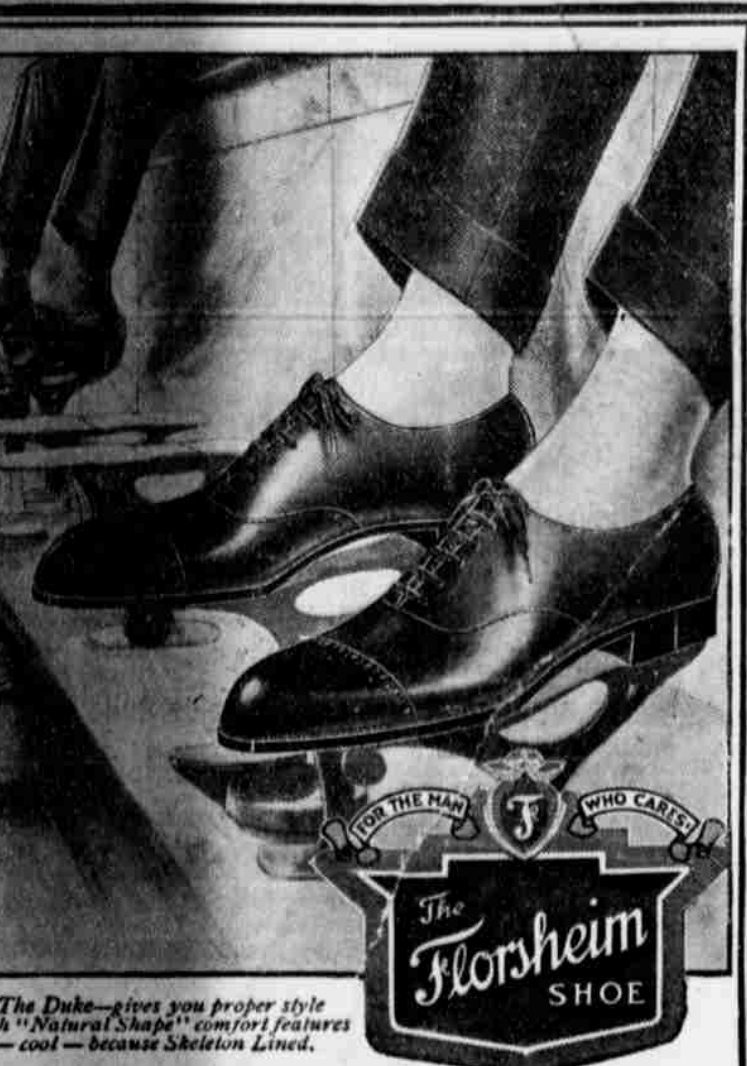
