### DAIRYMEN TO HOLD PICNIC

Prof. Graves to Address Big Gathering at Enegren's Grove Tomorrow.

County Agriculturist Smith and Prof. R. O. Graves arrived here today noon from Coquille and left this afternoon for Coos River, where they will attend the big picnic of the Coos Bay dairymen tomorrow.

Professor Graves is head of the dairy department of O. A. C. and will talk on dairy condition in Coos County, making suggestions as to the best means of improving them. He will also show how to select good dairy cows, stock being brought from the Rogers and Landrith ranches to demonstrate livestock judging.

In addition to this, a big picnic dinner will be enjoyed and also a program of sports.

At Myrtle Point last Friday, about 125 dairymen gathered for a meeting and at Arago Saturday Professor Graves addressed 150.

#### CONSETTI POISONS YOUNG GIRL.

She Rubs It on Face and Dear's May be the Result.

SHAMOKIN, Pa., July 29.—As the result of having a handful of confection rubbed over her face during the old home week celebration, Miss Mary Paris, a popular young girl of this city, is confined to her home suffering with blood poisoning. The poison has spread and her head is swollen to twice its normal size. Attending physicians say her recovery is doubtful.

### LIQUID LAWS HARD ON WETS

New Law Makes It Serious Offense to Deliver Booze in Dry Territory.

PORTLAND, Or., July 29.—Delivery of intoxicating liquors in prohibition territory was held to be a violation of the local option law by District Judge Jones in a decision rendered in the trial of Maurice and Benjamin Klimes, owners of Klimes Bros. liquor store at 243 Washington street and of J. J. Connelly, employed as a driver by the Klimes.

The charge against Connelly, that of making the delivery of six bottles of beer to David Delano, 613 Sherret avenue, were dismissed by Judge Jones, who held Connelly's employers liable for his actions. The Klimes were fined \$50 each.

According to the testimony, the Klimes employed a solicitor, who took orders in Precinct 102, "dry" territory. The solicitor turned his orders over to the store and Connelly then made the deliveries.

The trial was in the nature of a test of the local option law, and the ruling of the court affects all the liquor dealers of the state. In asking for a conviction, Deputy District Attorney Mowry said: "The state asks a conviction to serve as a standing interpretation of the law, that other liquor dealers may take notice."

#### ROBERT DOLLAR LEAVES.

Robert Dollar, the millionaire lumberman of San Francisco, arrived here at noon from Coos county and left on the afternoon train for Portland. Mr. Dollar is interested in extensive timber holdings in the Coos Bay country and spent the past two weeks there inspecting the same. Mr. Dollar also owns the steamers which bear his name. —Roseburg Review.
