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

FRENCH TRIAL

Case of Madame Caillaux, Being Tried for Murder of Editor of Figaro. Attracts.

PARIS, July 21 .- The Brial of Madame Calllaux for the murder of Gaston Calmette, editor of Figaro, began at noon in the Palace of Justice. Thousands surged outside vainly seeking entrance and the greatest excitement prevailed.

As soon as the jurors had been drawn by lot and the four judges composing the court had taken their places, President Albanel called loudly; "Bring in the prisoner," The Republican guards opened a small door in the wall beneath a bust of the Goddess of Liberty and Mme. Caillaux stepped into the tribunal. The light and the massed faces turned toward her made her faint and she was led in on the arm of a guard and gave her name in a whisper.

In reciting the story of her life,

Madame Calllaux said:
"M. Calllaux was premier and in marrying him I thought all would be happy. But, alas! my life began to be poisoned by calumnies in the campaign of Le Figaro against my husband. All the people in the sa-lons I frequented received me with smiles intended to wound me, These slanderous rumors pentertated ev-ery part of society. I was no longer able to go to the sittings of the Chamber of Deputies because I was the objete of unpleasant attention from the galleries."

IREATY SIGNED

Secretary of State and Uraguaian Minister Sign Commission Agreement.
