ASTORIA BARS WORDS.

Mayor Gray Will Forbid Use of "Bar" and "Proposed" About Harbor.

ASTORIA, Or., July 23 .- Mayor E. E. Gray has issued a proclamation eliminating the words "bar" and "proposed" from the vocabulary of lreater Astoria as related to the entrance of the Columbia River and the improvement enterprises in progress in this city and vicinity. The mayor states that a channel of sufficient depth, tides considered, exists at the mouth of the Columbia to admit the largest vessels plying the Pacific to Astoria docks, and that the big development enterprises, involving the expenditure of nearly six millions of dollars at Astoria and vicinity, are no longer projected, but in actual op-eration—hence the words "bar" and 'proposed" are obsolete in these con-
