ASTORIA BARS WORDS.

Mayor Gray Will Forbid Use of "Bar" and "Proposed" About Harbor.

ASTORIA, Or., July 23.—Mayor E. E. Gray has issued a proclamation eliminating the words "bar" and "proposed" from the vocabulary of Greater Astoria as related to the entrance of the Columbia River and the improvement enterprises in progress in this city and vicinity. The mayor states that a channel of sufficient depth, tides considered, exists at the mouth of the Columbia to admit the largest vessels plying the Pacific to Astoria docks, and that the big development enterprises, involving the expenditure of nearly six millions of dollars at Astoria and vicinity, are no longer projected, but in actual operation—hence the words "bar" and "proposed" are obsolete in these connections.

TALK HARBOR WORK FRIDAY

Rivers and Harbors Congressman to Speak Here Tomorrow Night on Waterways.

Capt. Wilson I. Davenny, field secretary for the National Rivers and Harbors Congress, which has its headquarters in Washington, D. C., is on Coos Bay for a few days' sojourn, having arrived here today on the Geo. W. Elder from Eureka.

Secretary Motley of the Chamber of Commerce has arranged to have Mr. Davenny speak at the Chamber of Commerce meeting tomorrow night and it is desired to get everyone out to hear him. His talk will be of vital interest here now, owing to the government appropriations here being cut off for the time being.

Captain Davenny was a member of the staff of the New York Tribune for several years, was one of the founders of the United Spanish War Veterans, and the founder and publisher of the Spanish War Review, the official paper of that organization.

During the past sixteen months he has traveled 15,000 miles on the Atlantic, Gulf and Pacific coasts, in the interests of the National Rivers and Harbors Congress. He has been on the Pacific Coast since January, having come to address the Inland Waterways Congress at its meeting in San Francisco. Since then he has addressed numerous organizations interested in the line of development he represents.
