Ride Surf-Board.—L. L. Thomas, Archie Johnson and Tom Burns essayed the surf-board ride this afternoon.

Candy Man Here.—J. W. Vogan, president of the Modern Confectionery Company of Portland, is spending a few days here as the guest of W. C. Bradley.

Motorcycle Collision.—Last evening an auto driven by Sharkey Phillips and a motorcycle ridden by Max Kruger collided at the corner of Second and Commercial. Kruger was slightly hurt and the motorcycle pretty badly smashed. The auto belonged to Ray Martin.

Fruit Scarce.—Fruit and vegetables on the local market are rather scarce as a result of no boats being in from San Francisco for a few days. Even the Coos River ranchers were short on a number of kinds of vegetables, saying that it is just between crops for them.

Answers in Kinney Suit.—Attorney Bryson, who is now in North Bend, says nearly all the answers in the matter of the receivership of L. D. Kinney have been filed and that he expects little or no testimony to be taken in the large majority of judgment creditors.

Fences Traced.—R. E. Shine and others who are opposing the opening of Curtis avenue to a width of sixty feet have fenced in their lots out to the fifty three foot mark. Whether the city will allow the fence to remain is a question that will probably come up at Monday night's Council meeting.

Money on Stage.—There were twenty incoming passengers on the Drain stage line this morning, requiring three autos to bring them down the beach from Gardiner. Capt. Cornwall is said to be figuring on changing his stage line from Drain to Florence as soon as the Southern Pacific establishes train service from Eugene to the Siuslaw point.

Plank Alley.—Chas. Doane and other property owners in South Marshfield are endeavoring to have the alley between Broadway and Second street, extending from Curtis to Hall, planked with the old planking torn out of Broadway. While some of the old planking is useless, considerable of it is good, and by utilizing it the alley could be improved at a slight cost.

Moves Business.—F. G. Horton has completed the moving of the stock of the Allen & Lewis Company into its new quarters on South Broadway. The front of the warehouse is to be improved and other changes made, but he has arranged things temporarily. He now has much needed room to care for the rapid growth his business has been enjoying.

Defends Chamberlain.—The Portland Journal has a three-quarter column interview with Hugh McLain of Marshfield, denying the statement of Capt. Macgenn that Senator Chamberlain had not done anything for Coos Bay. Mr. McLain gives Chamberlain credit for passing the bill to close Mill Slough, for get-

ing a bill up for providing funds for moving the life-saving station and says Chamberlain will get a \$2,000,000 appropriation at the next session of Congress to restore the Coos Bay jetties.

Child Dies.—Miss Barbara Lucy Payne, the 3-months-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. F. W. Payne, died at their home about 5 o'clock this morning. She had been ailing for some time and although every effort and care was exerted by the parents, it was in vain.
