## RECITAL TUESDAY.

Much interest is being manifested in the violin recital to be given Tuesday night at the Finnish Hall by Mr. Carl Grissen, a former Marshfield young man who has gained fame in music. He will be assisted by Lew Keyzer and Mrs. Wm. Horsfall, Jr., and the program promises to be one of unusual merit which no music lover should miss. Concerning a recent recital given in Portland by Mr. Grissen, the Portland Journal said: "The Kreutzer sonata by Beethoven is a stupendous work for violin and piano that to be appreciated for its full worth requires a musical audience and for that reason and because of its many technical intricacies is not often heard in recital. Carl Grissen, however, in making his debut here Wednesday evening in concert at the Lincoln high school auditorium, opened his program with it and succeeded splendidly in arousing and maintaining a keen interest throughout its performance. Mr. Grissen is a native of Oregon who recently returned after several years of study and concert work in Europe, the east and middle west. He is a serious musician working towards the elevation of the art, which as to its technical features he regards as a science. Miss Abby Whiteside played with elegance the piano accompaniment, which calls for as much artistry as the violin score. Other numbers played by Mr. Grissen were Canonetta, op. 51, by Friml, 'Melodie Tartare' by Kosloff, Concerto in G Minor, op. 26 by Max Bruch and 'Zigeunerweisen' by Sarasate, all of them cleanly executed, artistically interpreted and with a big solid tone. For encores he played 'Cradle Song' by Houser and a fantasia arranged by himself on the theme of 'My Old Kentucky Home'."

The Eugene Register says: F. L.
