**PLAN ARREST IN CALF CASE**  
Constable Cox to Arrest Petromou and Wife in the Rodine Case.

Constable W. B. Cox left this afternoon with a warrant for the arrest of Mr. and Mrs. L. J. Petromou of Allegany, on the charge of stealing and killing a 2-year-old heifer from the Chas. Rodine ranch. They will probably be arraigned before Justice Pennock tomorrow or next day.  
For a time last night there was a doubt about the arrest of the couple. District Attorney Liljeqvist was here last evening and he was in doubt about the evidence. Anyway, he said, he was going on a vacation trip to Curry County tomorrow and did not have time to prosecute it. Thereupon Mr. Rodine secured John D. Goss to prosecute, feeling that the evidence was plain. Mr. Rodine identified the head found buried on the Petromou place as that of his heifer. A bullet wound in the head corresponds with a rifle shot that others heard when the heifer was first missed. The trouble will be to prove that the salted meat found in the Petromou house is the meat from Rodine's calf.  
Petromou and family formerly lived in Marshfield and operated the French Realty Company.  
Mr. Rodine has called as witnesses Miss Carrie Rodine, Chas. Kruger, Jean Terry, Geo. A. Gould and Fred Gage.
