MAKE REPORT ON BAR WORK

Major Morrow Files Statement of Government Harbor Improvements.

PORTLAND, Or., Aug. 1.—Annual reports of the first and second rivers and harbors districts have been completed and forwarded to Washington, D. C., by Lieutenant-Colonel Charles H. McKinstry and Major Jay J. Morrow. The first district comprises the waterways under improvement on the Oregon coast south of the Columbia River, the middle and upper Columbia and the Snake River, and is in charge of Major Morrow. In part the reports say:

On the Coquille River funds reached \$5645.22 and on the harbor at Coos Bay \$146,889.26. The maintenance of the Coos River channel cost \$2586.09; improving Sluslaw River \$123,924.55; Tillamook Bay and bar \$16,813.20; Nehalem Bay \$26,019.23; North Portland harbor channel \$21,617.09, and improving Yaquina River \$28,960.67.

On the Coquille River project work was carried on in the river between its mouth and the mouth of the north fork and the projected depth of 10 feet for a width of 80 feet was obtained through the removal of 23,675 cubic yards of sand. During the year 470 vessels navigated across the bar and 4262 passengers were car-
