COUPLE HELD FOR STEALING

Louis Petromoulx and Wife Are Bound Over for Theft of Rodine's Calf.

Mr. and Mrs. Louis Petromoulx were bound over to the grand jury this morning by Justice Penneck on the charge of stealing and slaughtering a 2-year-old heifer belonging to C. A. Rodine of North Coos River. Their bonds were fixed at \$500 each.

Justice Penneck announced his decision at the conclusion of the hearing this forenoon. The hearing was a lengthy one and strong evidence against the Petromoulx was introduced by John D. Goss, who acted as private prosecutor, as District Attorney Liljeqvist had to go away on a vacation. Last evening the court continued the session. The witnesses for the prosecution were C. A. Rodine, Miss Carrie Rodine, Chas. Kruger, Fred Gage, Geo. A. Gould and Jean Terry.

No witnesses for the defense were heard, Attorneys Graves and McInturff not calling the accused on the stand. They had subpoenas issued for P. E. Larson of Allegany, Fred K. Gettins and Abner Tribbey, but Constable Cox said that he was later instructed by the defense not to serve the subpoenas.

Petromoulx and his wife formerly lived in Marshfield, but sometime ago moved to the Geo. Channing place, three miles from Allegany. While here, they styled themselves the French Realty Co.

Bond Is Furnished.
About noon Mr. and Mrs. Petromoulx furnished \$800 bond for their appearance before the grand jury and Justice Penneck finally consented to reduce the security from \$1000 to that amount. The bond was signed by James Bennett and Arthur Blanchard. Mr. and Mrs. Petromoulx left for Allegany this afternoon.
