BANDON GETS NEW BUILDINGS

MANY IMPROVEMENTS POSTPONED UNTIL NEXT SPRING, BUT NEW GALLER HOTEL SEEMS ASSURED.

BANDON, Ore., Aug. 1.—The near approach of the rainy season calls for a halt in the proposed building operations in this city. Probably the last special permit for temporary structure has been granted, for a building to house the Ocon Shoe Store. Work was begun on this Wednesday morning.
The larger buildings contemplated will in all probability, be held up until spring breaks next year. The \$25,000 Hotel Gallier to be built for J. C. Hammel is the surest large building in sight, work on which may begin soon, as all but about \$1500 of the stock had been subscribed early in the week.
The plans for the concrete two-story building proposed by Rasmussen brothers, Dr. Biggs and Mrs. Biggs and Mrs. Buckingham on their property in the recently burned area, have not yet been adopted, but should arrangements be completed immediately, it is possible that it will be begun soon and an attempt made to finish it before winter.
Another large structure is an entire block on the south side of First street on the lots owned by Grose Brothers, Messrs. Johnson, Marshall, Averill and Hartman. This will also be of concrete, and in fact all buildings within a large fire area are by ordinance compelled to be of fire proof construction of some kind.
All of the burned out business houses have found quarters in different places, most of them taking advantage of the special building rules which allow the maintenance of a clap board shack for a year. The Ocon Shoe Company will be the last to enter such quarters.

HOW IT FEELS IN AUTO WRECK

Hitting a Wall at 40 Miles an Hour Equals a Fall of Fifty Feet.

Every now and then some Coos County auto driver has a collision, either with another car or some permanent object. It is interesting to know the force of the impact. Some genius has figured it out that if a motor car is wrecked when going forty miles an hour and its occupant is thrown out against a wall, a post or a fence with the same force that he would strike if he fell to the ground from the height of 53.78 feet. To get an idea of what the force of this impact might be, stand on a wall or a house 53.78 high, look down and contemplate the jump.
If the car is going sixty miles an hour the impact is equivalent to a fall of 121 feet. The following table gives the force of various speeds an hour:

10 miles equals a fall of	3.36 feet
15 miles equals a fall of	7.56 feet
20 miles equals a fall of	13.44 feet
25 miles equals a fall of	21.01 feet
30 miles equals a fall of	30.25 feet
35 miles equals a fall of	41.17 feet
40 miles equals a fall of	53.78 feet
45 miles equals a fall of	68.05 feet
50 miles equals a fall of	85.03 feet
55 miles equals a fall of	103.67 feet
60 miles equals a fall of	123.99 feet
70 miles equals a fall of	164.69 feet
80 miles equals a fall of	215.10 feet
90 miles equals a fall of	272.24 feet
100 miles equals a fall of	336.10 feet

CRABS "MADE" THIS YEAR.

Washington Physician Says He Can Create Live Fish.

SEATTLE, Wash., Aug. 1.—"During the past year I have succeeded in creating a live soft shell crab and a live fish from chemicals," Dr. Charles W. Littlefield of this city said, when asked about his statement to this effect at the New Thought Convention in Portland. "Previous to that I had created reptilian forms of life."
"The same chemical compounds in the same quantities and grouped in the same manner will always produce the same thing. Different species of organic life are merely certain compounds grouped in a certain way. I have learned that the evaporation of water will create life and that the evaporation of water at the natural temperature of the organic species I desire to create will produce the life if the mixture and grouping of the chemical compounds are right. The things I claim are easily demonstrated."
"I have never been able to create these organisms except from March 21 to June 21. Scientists as a body are opposed to me because the things I have proved discredit the Darwinian theory of the origin of all life from a single primordial cell."

BRUCE ISMAY AN OUTCAST

Friends Desert the Steamship Official Accused of Cowardice.

COSTELLO, Galway, Ireland, Aug. 1.—Where is Bruce Ismay?
For two years the steamship corporation official, who drew the criticism of the world after the sinking of the Titanic, has been missing from the places that used to know him.
The captain of the lost liner went down with his ship, the first mate ended his broken life, and Bruce Ismay, making his way into a lifeboat and to the deck of the rescue ship Carpathia, sailed to safety.
Then of a sudden he disappeared. Rumor whispered that his one time friends avoided him, that club committees desired his resignation, even that his mind had failed under the terrible strain.

At the Heel of the Sea.

Englishmen have scant sympathy for a coward. Few men would be willing to live the life that Bruce Ismay saved from the sea. No longer a steamship magnate, no longer a Beau Brummel in Belgravia, the question of his whereabouts assumed the significance of a mystery.

Meantime the lost director was living in a remote house on a place known as the Heel of the Sea. The loneliest road in Ireland runs from Minna to Costello along the shore of Galway Bay. Sheer moor, quite treeless, bleak beyond words, hardly a stone cabin in sight, and no path but the straight mail road.

In the heart of this Irish wilderness a solitary lodge shows white against its surrounding path of green. A locked gate forbids entrance. Sheumans, the old sidecar driver, flourishes an accusing whip-lash through the teeming rain.

"Look Where He Hides."
"Look there where he hides. Never a gentleman have I brought here but was turned away from the very door. Money he has and all that money will buy. But he cannot shake off the memories on his mind. Day after day he must hear them—the shrieks of the drowning men crying down the wind. This is his curse. What he did will be remembered until the Titanic is forgotten."

"Lonely enough the place is. He little thought we would know him—we that stood round the Marconi masts at Clifton waiting a long week for a word from across the sea. Cast your eyes about this place, bog and moor and fields of stone. I have seen men and women here, decent, civil people, blue with hunger and starved with the cold. But not one of them all, old or young, would change places with the man who lives in that lodge—Bruce Ismay."

COOS COUNTY MAIL SERVICE

Coos and Curry Counties have about 30,000 people within their borders. They are as good citizens of the United States as can be found anywhere.
