### J. V. HODSON PASSES AWAY

Prominent Rancher, Dairyman and Business Man Dies at North Bend.

J. V. Hodson, one of the best known and most highly respected citizens of North Bend, died at his home after nearly a year's illness of a complication of diseases. Mr. Hodson was forty-nine years old and was born and reared in Coos county. His father, the late Dr. Jonathan Hodson, was one of the best known pioneers of the Coos River section. J. V. Hodson devoted his early days to ranching and dairying and later moved to North Bend, where he engaged in the grocery business. He is survived by a wife, two sons and a daughter. His mother also survives him and makes her home with her daughter, Mrs. J. E. Edmunds, in South Marshfield. E. R. Hodson and W. P. Hodson of South Coos River, Mrs. J. E. Edmunds of Marshfield, Mrs. M. J. Pratt, Mrs. Robert Agers, of California, Mrs. Oliver Joy of Salem and Byron Hodson, of Catewing Inlet, are surviving brothers and sisters of the deceased. Mr. Hodson was a prominent member of the Knights of Pythias and the Masons. Every sympathy is being extended to the bereaved family. His two sons, Fremont and Evan Hodson, have been prominent in the younger set at North Bend and his daughter is Mrs. Carl Golden. The funeral services will be held from the United Brethren church in North Bend at 10 o'clock Tuesday morning. Immediately after the exercises at the church the funeral party will leave on the Alert, stopping at Marshfield about 11:30 and proceeding to the family burial ground on Coos River.
